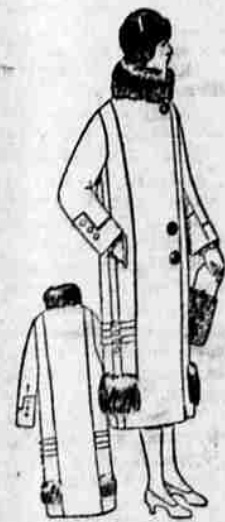

SETAK PURCHASES CARLSON RANCH

To Develop Carlson Property Into Modern Dairy Farm in Near Future
William Setak, formerly of Salem, Oregon, but more recently of this county, has purchased the P. C. Carlson ranch of 240 acres, the deal having been consummated Saturday. The consideration is understood to have been in excess of \$10,000. Mr. Setak owned property in the vicinity of Salem and sold it to W. A. Dezell, former resident of this city and now secretary to Governor

Pierce. He came here and leased a ranch near Midland, the property of Mr. Dezell and this he farmed this year. So well satisfied was he with Klamath county that he decided to purchase a farm, with the result that he acquired the Carlson ranch.

It is the intention of Mr. Setak to develop the Carlson property into a modern dairy farm, it being his belief that Klamath county offers ideal conditions for the dairy business.

For many years Mr. Setak was a guard at the penitentiary at Salem, resigning that position about two years ago.
