tors of the street vacation, insisted. The attorney pictured the councilmen as trustees of the city and explained the right held for the councilmen as trustees of the city and explained the right held for the streets and alleys affected in the controversy, by the property holders abutting onto the thoroughfares. A street should be vacated only when it is a burden, Mr. Jones pointed out, and then he asked any councilman to show how these streets and alleys had been a burden on the city.

"We are experiencing a development here that can not be ignored," he said. "As a result the means of ingress and egress into all sections of town should be maintained inviolate."

Hints at Railroad Deal
"Suppose the property were to be vacated and turned over to the industrial concerns. They could do anything they wanted with it. They could sell it to some railroad company anxious to secure the whip hand over its rival. They could do anything with it and the city and property holders of that district would suffer."

Mr. Jones introduced a letter from A. H. McHoffie, a property owner on the street abutting onto one of those which would be vacated, protesting against such action on the ground that it would but increase the fire hazard in that district.

"Somebody's been filling him with a lot of stuff about this," D. V. Kuykendall, attorney for the heating plant and lumber companies, held. "The fact of the matter is that if this issue had come up a year ago, there would never have been any objection. Certain people are using it to further their political interests."

Govern Self by Future
"You should be governed by the future not the past in handling this subject. You should not let the dead hand of Quincy Brooks, who dedicated this property to the city, to stay the industrial development of the town, upon which the present prosperity is based."

Oakland Doubles Sales In August

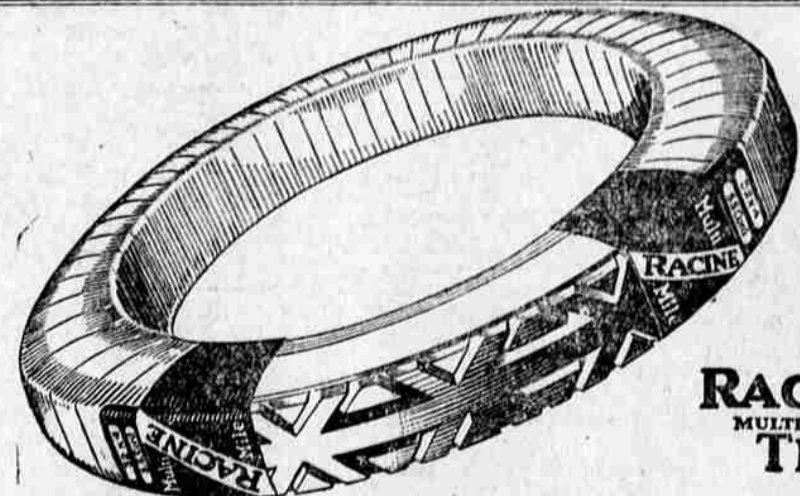
