The jury held that the officer acted in the line of duty.

In an oral supplement to the formal verdict the jury stated that it was convinced the shooting was accidental, but that there was insufficient evidence to state this in the written verdict. Talent claimed on the witness stand that his gun was discharged accidentally when the automobile in which he was riding with N. C. Chaney, district attorney of Jackson county, collided with another automobile.
