## MALIN FARMERS ALL STAND PAT

come to Malin, when the S. P. built their road.

Malin farmers quietly listened till their mayor had finished. There was even a slight silence after Dr. Trout had completed and then Frank Zumpf jumped up.

### Tired of Promises

"I have been here for over 15 years," he explained in quick short sentences. "The Southern Pacific when I first came here promised they would build us a line down here. They didn't keep their promise. They lied. We haven't any railroad now. I don't believe they will keep their promise to put us on a main line. I favor the Northern lines. We ought to help them build into Klamath Falls. They haven't made any false promises."

### S. P. Eulogy

Dr. Trout made a supreme effort to whitewash the Southern Pacific of its failure to carry out its promise to construct the Modoc Northern railroad, but failed. He ventured into details of engineering data, brought up the age old argument 'it was the war' and asserted that the S. P. was sincere in its efforts to do all it can for all the people.

John Reber, manager of the cheese factory at Malin interposed: "What is the use of arguing. We want the Oregon Trunk into Klamath Falls. A road will be built down here—don't worry. If there isn't, Klamath Falls will grow so fast with two railroads that we will have a consuming center that will be a market for nearly all of our products."

### Too Many Lies

Ferdinand Slavok, a giant in stature, with shoulders of a bull, brought laughter and cheers from the audience by stating at this point: "The Southern Pacific has made promises and failed to keep them. They lied. The Oregon Trunk hasn't told us any lies because they haven't made any promises. I am in favor of staying with Oregon Trunk."

### Rev. Hulet Speaks

If the Rev. C. C. Hulet's judgment is correct, Merrill and the surrounding community stands strong for the Southern Pacific and their program, and against the Northern lines.

"I have talked to a number of people, and they all seem to favor the S. P.," he said.

"Do you mean to tell me that the people of Merrill, who just a few months ago voted unanimously for the Northern lines, have back tracked and are now just as strong for the Southern Pacific?" A. M. Thomas, secretary of the Klamath Irrigation District asked.

"Well, yes, that is my observation," the minister replied. "I can't believe it," Thomas exclaimed.

It was the opinion of Harry Wilson, prominent rancher, that Merrill failed to show cooperation with Malin.

"All Merrill people want is something for Merrill," he averred. "They don't care if we are on a spur line, a through line or no line at all, just so long as they are fixed."

"That is not so," the Merrill minister objected. "You have the wrong idea entirely."

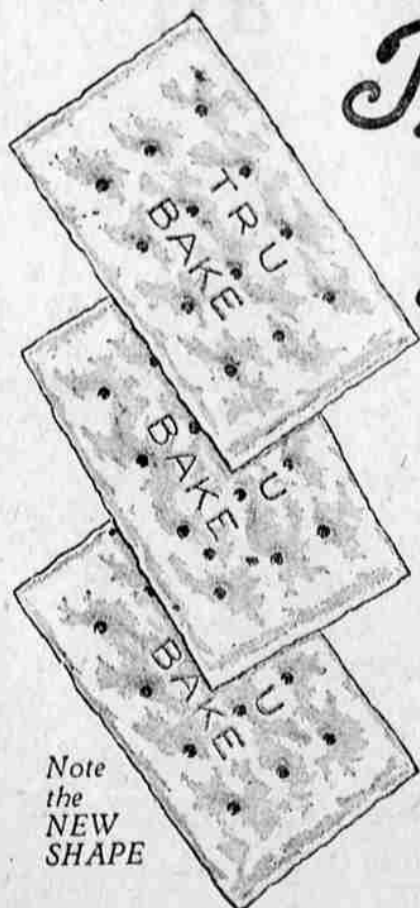
by Presiding Circuit Judge Tucker to produce Wilma Lucile Taylor, 11 year old daughter of Melvin J. Taylor, of Yakima, Wash., in court next Monday and to show cause why the girl is being kept from her father.

The order was issued on petition for a writ of habeas corpus, filed in behalf of Taylor by W. S. U'Ren, local attorney. According to U'Ren's story, Alta F. and Melvin J. Taylor were married in 1909 at Rainier, later moving to Yakima, where they lived together until 1921, when Mrs. Taylor obtained a divorce by default. She was given custody of Wilma and a son.

De Castellane and Mrs. Taylor were married in 1923 at Mt. Vernon, Wash., later moving to Portland. The mother died on August 3 of this year.

The son was sent to his father, but the father was not. Taylor, according to U'Ren, came to Portland and talked matters over with the man, who said he did not know where the girl could be located, but that she might possibly be in California.

A. M. Thomas argued against the Southern Pacific.

"Oh, Promise Me" "I can not place much credence in the Southern Pacific promises," he insisted. "They make too many of them. First the S. P. was going to run their main line east by way of Lakeview. Then there was a big howl, down this way. Now they have routed it down this way to appease the kickers. But it is all on paper."

Finally Subside And so it went for two hours. As minute succeeded minute the S. P. spokesmen gradually subsided until during the last half hour they had nothing to say.

Dr. Trout earnestly urged that the farmers select some citizen of Malin who was familiar with the railroad situation, and send him to Portland to attend the Interstate commerce commission hearing.

His request was politely overruled by the farmers on the ground that there would be from one to three representatives from Malin who will be at the hearing.
