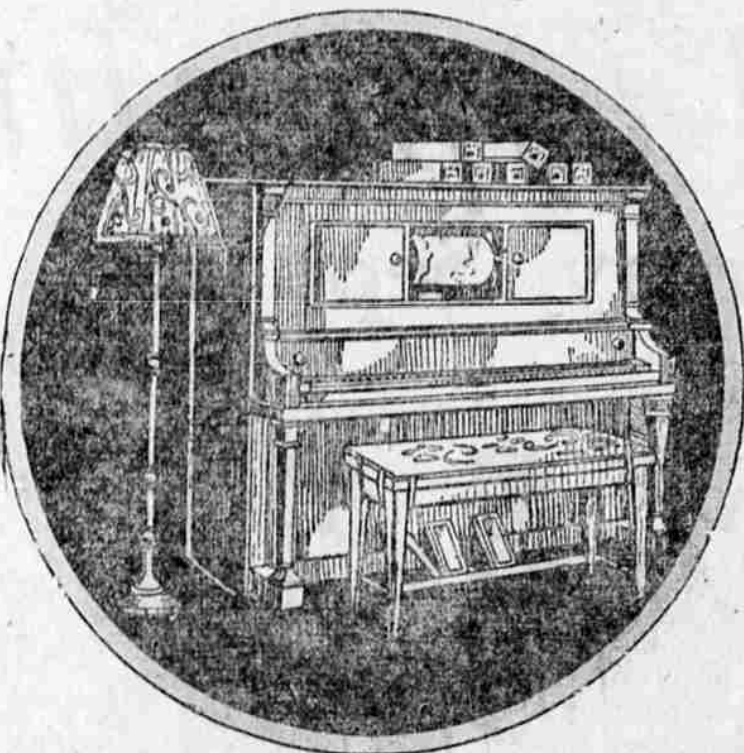

IOWA WINNER OF BUTTER CONTEST

National Banner Goes to Corn State—Other Awards Announced

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 18. (AP)—Iowa won the national banner at the national creamery buttermakers' association contest, it was announced today at the convention of the association here. The final average of the ten highest scores in the various contests by states were: Iowa, 94,739; Minnesota 94,239; Wisconsin 93,561; Oregon 92,913; South Dakota 92,571.
The highest individual score in the fresh butter contest was made by J. M. Rasmussen of St. Charles, Minn., with 96. The highest individual score for cold storage butter went to L. E. Nelson of Randall, Iowa, 95.50.
Prizes were announced as follows:

Silver loving cup for highest percentage of exhibits entered—Oregon, second Washington.
Cup for highest exhibitor from Washington—D. Thurlksen, Snohomish; California, C. D. Peterson, Ferndale.
Medals for best exhibits of fresh butter—First, J. N. Rasmussen, St. Charles, Minn.; Second, Frank T. Chipton, Iowa; Third, F. H. Harms, Iowa.
Medals for cold storage butter—First, L. E. Nelson, Iowa; Second, Phil J. Lussen, Iowa; Third, Peter J. Refadahl, Iowa. Medal and banner offered by the Holstein-Friesian association, were also won by Iowa.

Highest scoring butter in Oregon—First, Frank Hepper, Mt. Angel; Second Adolph Erickson, Portland; Third three entries tied, H. W. Bradshaw, Eugene; H. H. Haroldsen, Portland and Frank Hettwer, Mt. Angel.
Individual butter judging contest—First, Oregon; Second, Idaho and Iowa tied; Third Washington; Fourth, Minnesota; Fifth, South Dakota and Sixth, Montana.
