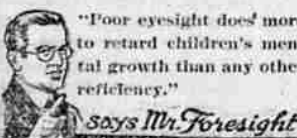

The Alpena concern, through its president Ralph E. Gilchrist brought suit this morning against a dozen defendants to quiet the title to the timber land north of the reservation.

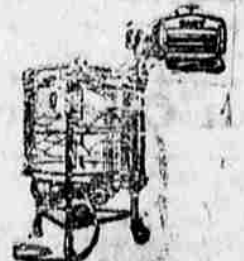
