Irish Meusel had a big day in helping the Giants top the Cubs, 5 to 2 yesterday. He banded out four doubles, a homer, two singles and a double, scoring twice himself and driving in two other tallies. As Pittsburgh was not scheduled its lead was cut to seven and one-half games.

Brooklyn's losing streak stretched to seven straight, the Cardinals taking the final of a series, 8 to 4. Four Robins were sent into the box.

Carlson limited the Reds to three hits while the Phillies won their last game at Cincinnati, 5 to 0. Luque gave nine bingles.

Washington emerged on top in a 10 inning struggle with the White Sox 6 to 5, Zachary relieving Walter Johnson in the eighth with the score tied at five all. Manager Eddie Collins of Chicago returned to the line-up as a pinch hitter after being laid up for several weeks with a sprained leg. Johnson twisted a leg muscle sliding into third base, but is expected to be able to pitch when his turn comes.

HAS EVIDENCE OF LIFE ON MARS, SAYS ENGLISHMAN

CAMBRIDGE, Eng.—G. H. Hamilton of Trinity College, soon will present to the International Astronomical Union what he regards as conclusive evidence of the existence on Mars of sentient beings with a civilization of 90,000 years to their credit.

"My proofs are forthcoming," said Dr. Hamilton recently. "That Mars is in the condition the earth is approaching—that is, a desert. Once it had seas, but they have disappeared. The mountains and hills are gone, worn away by wind erosion. The canals are not ditches nor water courses, as commonly supposed, but vegetation on each side of conduits of water. These conduits are routes of travel for commerce and anything else."

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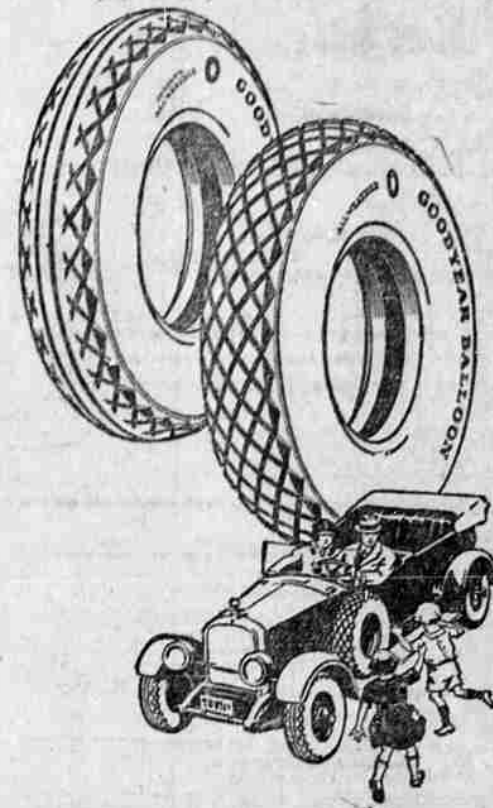
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Army Grid Leaders

TREE THAT AIDED INDIANS NOW HELPS FIRE FIGHTERS

LAKE ARROWHEAD, Calif.—One of the valuable aids to the United States forestry service in this mountain resort is a pine tree nearly 200 feet high, one the north shore of Lake Arrowhead. The tree serves the ranger lookout even as it served Indian warriors scores of years ago in tribal wars. At the base of the pine signs blazed in the past by the Indians may be seen dimly.

Today keen eyed rangers keep a continual watch in the upper branches for forest fires. They are equipped with powerful glasses and telephones in modern contrast to the sharp eyes of the aboriginal lookout and his crude wiv wag system.
