Work On Span On State Line Road To Start

Court Plans To Authorize Advertising For Bids

Legal machinery will be set in motion this afternoon for the construction of a pile bridge, 315 feet long, across Lost river. It was announced this morning by County Road Engineer Frank Z. Howard.

To be known as the State Line bridge, the span will be constructed at a cost of approximately \$5000. It is located on the state line, west of Malin, on the state line road.

Authorization to advertise for bids on the project was to have been authorized this afternoon.

The bridge is a cooperative project between Klamath county and Siskiyou county in which the two counties, owing to the fact that bridge is located on the Oregon-California boundary line, have agreed to cooperate on a 50-50 basis in the cost of construction.

New Traveling Man to Locate in This Section of Oregon

O. H. John Tuel, ex-convict of the state penitentiary, will be given a preliminary hearing tomorrow before Justice of the Peace Kendall to determine whether or not there is sufficient evidence to bind him over to the grand jury. Tuel is being held in the county jail under \$2000 bond. No charge of breaking into the Cofer Bros., safe has been filed.

75 Cars Laden With Beets To Leave Klamath

Sugar Content Claimed To Be Exceptionally High

Seventy-five carloads of sugar beets, all southbound for the Sacramento valley, will be shipped from Klamath county to the Sacramento Valley Sugar company, it was estimated this morning by M. H. Oldemeyer, field representative of the sugar company.

Although late planting precluded any phenomenal crops, the grade of sugar beets raised in Klamath this year is equal and in most cases better than the best beets raised anywhere in the west, Mr. Oldemeyer said.

One of the best crops is the 20 acres on the Ezell ranch to the south of town which will average close to 14 tons to the acre. Throughout the county the tonnage per acre will vary from 7 to 14 acres.

Elevator dumps, to facilitate loading the beets onto cars, will soon be in operation Mr. Oldemeyer said.

LOW BIDDER FOR ROAD JOB LOSES TO HIGH BIDDER

H. F. Vicory, Contractor, Gets Midland Market Road Contract Saturday

H. F. Vicory was awarded the Midland market road contract Saturday, but with an if attached to the award.

The condition is that Vicory will get the job if the state market road engineer approves his bid. The county court, although refusing to re-advertise for bids, not willing to take the entire responsibility of awarding the road contract.

There were two bidders for the project, Maddox and McGrath and H. F. Vicory. When bids were opened last week, it was found that Maddox and McGrath were the low bidders in point of actual cash offer, with a bid of \$8598.46.

It was also found, according to reports, that Vicory had failed to bid on 300 cubic yards of excavation and had failed to provide a surety bond, necessary by law.

Vicory's bid was changed, in open court. That is, he was allowed by the county court to bid on the rock excavation after the road bids had been opened.

Maddox and McGrath underbid Vicory by \$78.50. The county court's reason in giving the high bidder the contract was said to be a question of time. Vicory in his bid stated he would complete the project in 25 working days. Maddox and McGrath stated they would take till December 15 to finish.

Ground Broken for New Munger Plant On Klamath Avenue

Ground has been broken and a crew of workmen were busily at work this morning on the foundation of the new Munger laundry that is being erected on the corner of Fourth and Klamath.

Construction of the plant will be hurried in order that bad weather may not interfere, as it is hoped to occupy the building before winter. The investment in the project is approximately \$35,000.

Formerly it was planned to build the laundry on Main street, adjacent to the Imperial garage, but, realizing the advantage to be gained by being close to the city heating plant, the owners decided to move the location to Fourth and Klamath.
