Woman Burned to Death in Furnace

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Mrs. Sophia Poleskie, whose body was found today in the furnace of an east side lumber yard kiln, was placed in the furnace while alive and burned to death, Medical Examiner Schwartz announced. Two fractures were found on the woman's skull. George Symuk, fireman of the furnace, was charged with Mrs. Poleskie's death.

Suspend License of Insurance Firm

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 22.—After consulting Attorney General Van Winkle, Deputy State Real Estate Commissioner W. A. Mallen yesterday suspended the Oregon license of the United Auto Licensure Exchange, of which the United Underwriters, Inc., of Portland are attorneys-in-fact, for Oregon. The suspension was because of an alleged violation of the state insurance law relative to a bank deposit of \$25,000 which is required by the law, but which the company allowed to get beyond the control of its attorney in fact. The company was to have a hearing before the state department a week ago yesterday, but asked for a postponement to yesterday. Yesterday it failed to make an appearance and the license was suspended.

Pedestrians Will Fight Traffic Law

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 22.—(AP)—A test in court of new traffic regulation in Seattle, compelling pedestrians to wait for signals before crossing intersections fanned today. Yesterday two women were arrested. One duplied up her fist and hit Patrolman Hackler on the jaw when ordered to retrace her steps after crossing a street against a signal. The other was put in a cell when she refused to post \$2 bail. After 35 minutes she reconsidered. Her husband declared he would take the case to the supreme court.

TRADE CAMELS FOR BULLETS

BERLIN.—In Abyssinia camels represent the most valuable possession of the people, in many instances being used as the equivalent of money. Dr. Lutz Heck, son of the director of the Berlin Zoological garden, learned this while in quest of animals for the zoo. However, he found some Abyssinians who regarded rifle cartridges higher in value than the animals. He succeeded in getting six dromedaries, which are now in the Berlin zoo, for 15 cartridges.
