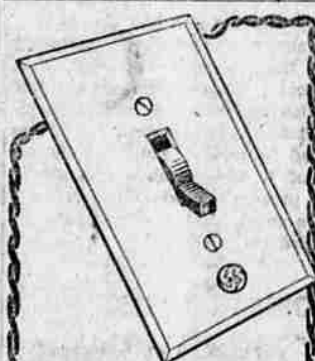

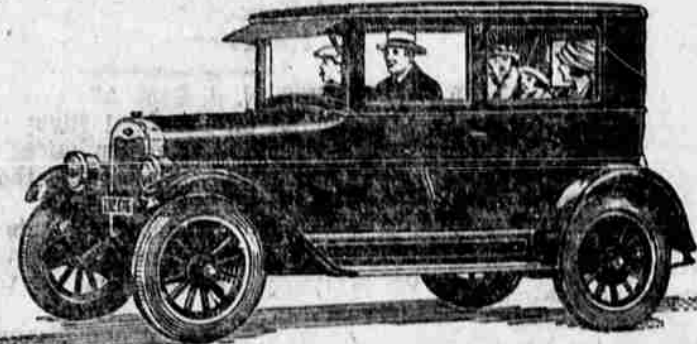
Tuel spurned the aid of a lawyer and took up his own defense.
