Hi School To Play At Pass Saturday P. M.

Rogue River Valley Is Scene of First League Game

Keyed up to a high pitch of enthusiasm, the Klamath County high school football team will play its first league game next Saturday afternoon with Grants Pass at Grants Pass. It was announced yesterday afternoon.

A few small changes in the first string line-up are expected to bolster up the first and second line of defense considerably. Considerable hope is placed in the forward pass as being the means of the local team gaining most of its ground Saturday.

In the practice game with Alturas, despite a muddy field and a slippery ball, the first team of the high school completed pass after pass. Yancey, backfield man, throws the football like a baseball, straight, fast and accurate.

A number of high school rooters are planning to accompany the team across the Cascades and into the Rogue River valley. The game will be the first for Klamath in the Southern Oregon league.

H. J. Overturf Sues For Five Per Cent Cut

Robert Metcalf Defendant in Case Filed Here Yesterday

When a real estate man has the word of a property owner to secure a buyer for the property he is entitled to the five per cent commission if he secures the buyer, whether the property is sold or not.

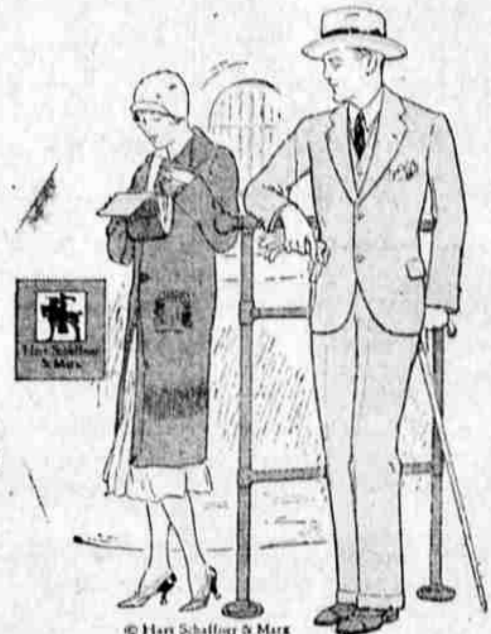
This is the contention of H. J. Overturf, who yesterday afternoon filed suit in circuit court against Robert Metcalf for \$325. Overturf claimed that Metcalf authorized him to secure a buyer for certain property in Klamath which would be sold for \$6500.

Overturf in his complaint, states that he secured the buyer but that Metcalf would not live up to his original proposition. He claims that inasmuch as he secured the buyer at the price, which he states was agreed upon, then he is entitled to the five per cent commission which will amount to \$325.
