WAR DEPRESSION AND U. S. FILMS EMBARRASS SWEDISH PRODUCER

STOCKHOLM.—(AP)—A long period of economic depression which followed the World War, and which still prevails in Sweden, and the importation of American films are the chief reasons given which compelled Albert Ranft, owner of seven theatres in Stockholm and Gothenburg, to put his affairs in the hands of a committee of his creditors.

Ranft started in the theatrical business 25 years ago as managing director of one of the leading Stockholm theatres and gradually increased his influence until he obtained control over a majority of the theatres in Stockholm. For many years his theatrical ventures were successful. The after-war depression, which materially decreased attendances, followed by the importation of American films created competition too strong for the Ranft theatres.

A morning arrival from Ashland was Emerson Blair who is here to transact business matters from the valley city.

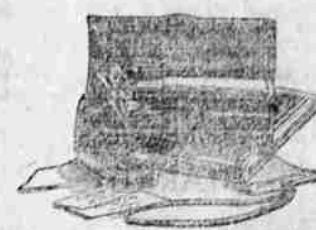
ROAD HOUSE KNOCKED OVER

Siskiyou to Have Bounty on Coyotes

YREKA, Calif., Sept. 24.—(Special to The Herald.)—Siskiyou will have a bounty of \$5 each on coyotes beginning in November, if present plans materialize.

When the board of supervisors allocated the general fund for the coming year, provision was made for the payment of the bounty, which has been urged by the granges of Siskiyou and by Klamath county, Oregon, where an intensified campaign against coyotes has been carried on for many months by state and federal agents.

While the bounty was not fixed, it is understood that at the October meeting the bounty will be fixed to take effect November 1.

The coyote question is rapidly becoming serious in Siskiyou where the depredations of the animals have steadily increased since the bounty was removed more than a year ago in an effort to reduce the county's budget.

Coal Mining Now On in Siskiyou

YREKA, Calif., Sept. 24.—Development work in the coal fields of the Siskiyou Coal & Coke company, between Montague and Ager, has been started by what is thought to be a large eastern production syndicate.

It is known that plans have been made to carry the development work on for a period of approximately 10 months. If the tonnage is sufficiently large to warrant the investment, it is reported that the company now on the field will purchase the holdings outright.

The coal fields attracted widespread attention last year when R. D. Clark, president of the Siskiyou Coal & Coke company, secured leases to the coal rights on several thousand acres of land in the northern end of the Shasta valley, including the Cooley and Richardson ranches. These were recorded in Yreka and shortly afterwards, the company was incorporated by local men and limited work was done in the old portal, where the mine was first opened years ago.

The development work is under the direction of Leverett Davis, a Colorado mining engineer of note, who has been in the Siskiyou region for more than a year and who is familiar with the various mineral strata and formations. He has a diamond drill and several men at work and not only is the old portal active but test holes are to be sunk in various sections of the acreage to determine the location and thickness of the coal veins.

Where the tunnel has been worked in the past, a vein ranging in thickness from 36 inches to five feet has been developed. Davis is working, it is said, with a view of striking other veins below the one already uncovered.
