Studebaker Still Leads in Exports

More high-powered motor cars were exported by Studebaker during the first six months of 1925 than by any other automobile maker in America.

In most countries, this achievement was won against the penalty of a horsepower tax, which makes ownership of cars more costly in proportion to their rated power.

In England, for example, the buyer must pay a yearly tax of one pound per rated horsepower, or about \$171 on a Studebaker Big Six, on which the power rating is 36.4.

In much of this territory, the Studebaker Big Six enjoys a reputation similar to that which a \$12,000 English-made car enjoys in America among the more well to do.

Durant and other eastern officials of the Durant interests, gave the details of Scott's promotion after the promotion had been confirmed by W. C. Durant, with whom Scott has been associated in the manufacture of automobiles since the earliest days of the industry.

ITALY TO HAVE ENCYCLOPEDIA

ROME.—(AP)—The Senatorial committee, entrusted with compiling the new official Italian encyclopedia, has completed its preliminary work and has accepted a program whereby its task will be completed in 1933. It is expected the work will consist of 32 volumes, each of about 1,000 pages.

The committee now is studying a suggestion that it compile a sixteen-volume biographical dictionary with scope extending from Roman days until the present.

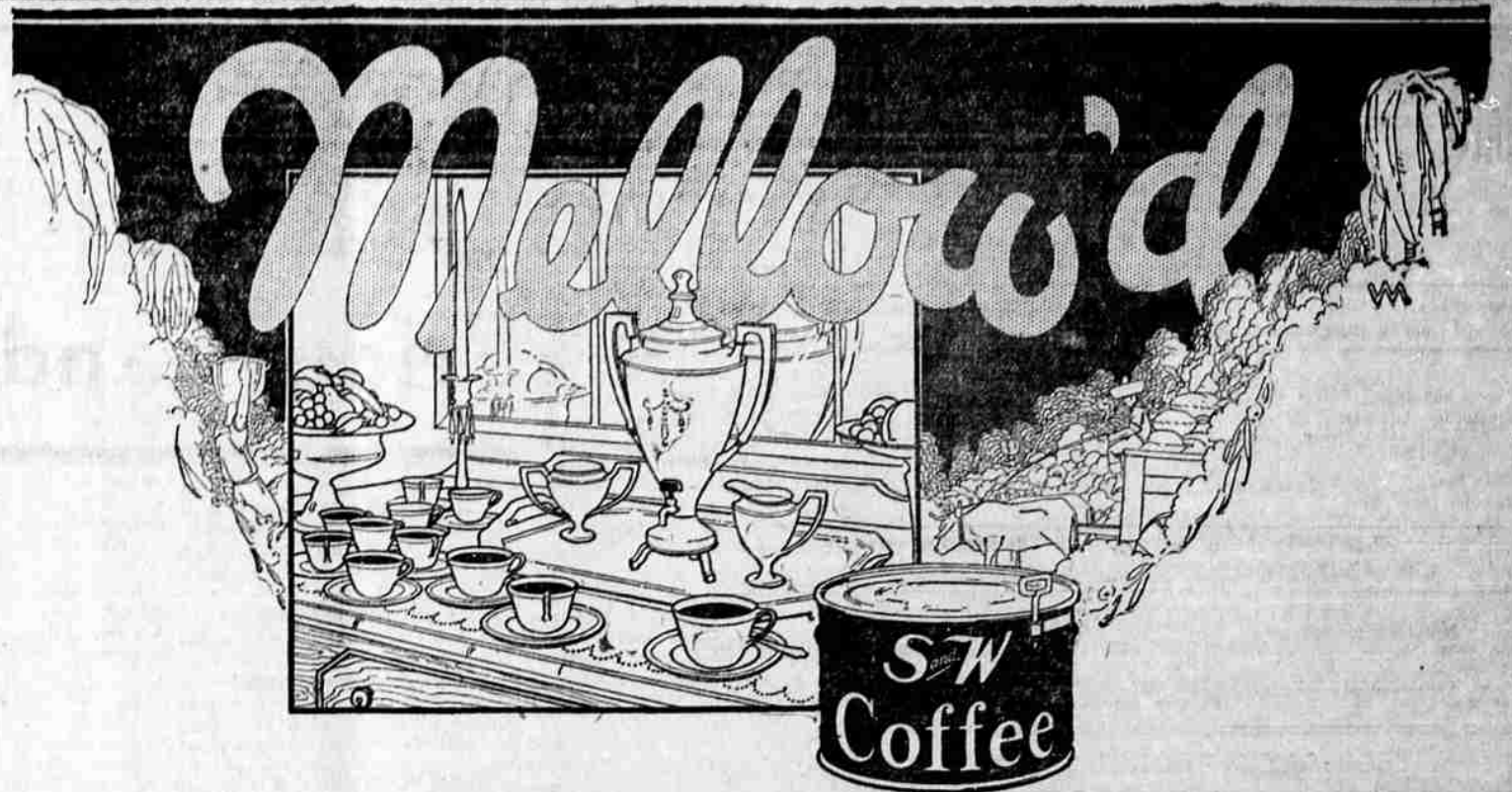
AMERICAN BUYERS REPORTED SEEKING TIMBER FROM FINLAND

HELINGFORS.—(AP)—Although Finnish timber has not yet found its way to the United States, a demand has been created in that country for timber from Finland and American buyers now are competing with those from Great Britain and France for the purchase of this commodity.

It was feared that the question of freight would be an important factor in the exporting of Finnish timber to America, but the Scandinavian Shipping Gazette points out that freight from Finland to New York or Boston is cheaper to those cities than from the west coast of the United States.
