Thirty-four days passed and no financial loss from fire in Klamath Falls.

This report from the local fire department today in itself explains the reason why Klamath's fire insurance rates are among the lowest in the Pacific northwest.

The last fire in Klamath Falls, where any damage was incurred, was on August 20 when an enclosed automobile caught fire and was seriously damaged.

Since that time there have been a few grass fires with no damage at all. The last call of the fire department was on September 2, to extinguish a grass fire.

Jack Rabbits Eat Potatoes

YREKA, Calif., Sept. 24.—Between deer, porcupines and jack rabbits, J. W. Byer of the Sheep Mountain district in Butte valley, trying to raise 30 acres of potatoes under vicissitudes.

The crop, to begin with, was the best in years, according to Byer, who recently made lamentation to his friends at MacJoel. Then the omnipresent jack rabbit discovered the toothsome tubers and started to excavate them. His invasion was followed by deer, who found the digging good and with their front hoofs, dug out more.

Byer began to guard the acreage at night and sleep by day but this became strenuous when the deer and the rabbits were joined by predatory porcupines, who pulled up the growing plants and ate the new potatoes.

As the result of the attacks on his crops, Byer welcomed the open season on deer. He had already to his credit more jack rabbits than he could count, and 27 porcupines. He is enjoying deer meat this week.

Last year Byer eliminated 73 porcupine before it was time to harvest his crop.

A limited number of potatoes will be sacked this year, if powder and shot hold out.

Auto Traffic to Midland Will Go By Detour Route

Within the next few days automobile traffic, Midland bound, will be routed over a detour in the section between Miller Hill school house and Midland.

Owing to the fact that H. F. Vicory, to whom was awarded the contract for grading that section of road, will start work in the next few days, it became necessary for the county road master to make provision for a detour.
