Indians Arrested on Second Charge

YREKA, Calif., Sept. 25.—(Special)—Because they were under arrest on one charge, Raymond Storrs and Jack Titus, members of the Klamath tribe at Happy Camp, thought that they were immune to arrest and proceeded to drop fire from the automobile that was bringing them from Happy Camp to the county jail here recently, according to Harvey Zearfoss, of the federal forest service and who arrested the men on the charge of setting fires in a national forest.

Storrs and Titus were being brought here by Constable Peter Grant and Deputy Andrew Brown on charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor recently, a charge that they were subsequently liberated on. They are charged with dropping burning rope from the machine in which they were riding to set fire to forests to get the fall burning, a custom of the Klamaths for many years. Four fires were started, the most serious one burning over many acres on Cade mountain in the Klamath National Forest.

The federal charge was lodged against them when the story of how the fires were set became known and Zearfoss took both men to Red Bluff Monday where they were held on \$1000 bail each for a preliminary hearing before United States Commissioner H. S. Gans Monday.
