Klamath Joins Association Of Rabbit Growers

Local Branch is Established at Meeting Last Night

At a meeting of the rabbit raisers of Klamath county and representatives from the Southern Oregon Rabbit Breeders' association from Rogue river and Talent who came over to give the new organization a right start, the Klamath branch of the Southern Oregon association was incorporated and officers for the ensuing year elected as follows: A. R. Reener, president, Klamath Falls; H. Brennan, vice-president, Klamath Falls; Lester Cummings, secretary and acting treasurer, R. F. D. No. 1, Klamath Falls.

The three officers are appointed to draw up a constitution and by-laws and the dues fixed at \$1.00 until January 1st, when the yearly dues will be decided upon. The next meeting will be held at Medford for October 9th, at which time the Klamath branch will be properly entertained by the Medford organization of rabbit breeders. Last night about twenty rabbit enthusiasts attended the meeting and fried rabbit feed held in Moose hall and aside from the officers of the newly formed association Matt Kohn, Klamath Falls, L. M. Gøber, Olene, F. W. Close near Olene, W. W. Donart the furrier of Klamath Falls, Bertha Renner and several others joined the association.

The primary purpose of the association is to stabilize the market for utility rabbits and secure an association price from the many channels using rabbit meat, such as the larger hotels and restaurants and butcher shops. Also the pooling of pelts from the fur bearing rabbits will later be one of the vital objects of the association. H. H. Low brought over a purebred and registered Chincilla doe which was auctioned at the meeting, going to Lester Cummings.

PIONEER DAYS TO BE RECALLED AT SISKIYOU FAIR

YREKA, Calif., Sept. 24.—(Special).—Three stage coaches, one of which will be driven by the man who drove it many years ago; an ox team, cowboys, miners, a covered wagon, old carriages and barouches will all play parts in the opening pageant of "Siskiyou Pioneer Days" to be given here October 9, 10 and 11, by the Siskiyou County Fair Association.

George L. Chase, who has done much toward staging the event, is the driver who will once again pick up the reins and riding in the coach will be pioneers who rode with him in the days before the railroad was unknown in northern California.

Chase and J. P. McNamara, representing the fair association closed yesterday with William Marston, a buckaroo of note; C. L. Gibson of Klamath Falls and W. Quigley of Hornbrook, to bring their string of bucking bronchos and unruly steers here for the rodeo that will be held on the fair grounds, south of Yreka. Chase and McNamara declare that event will be the best ever staged in Yreka and that it will bring back the days of the late '50s when Yreka was a veritable city of gold.

CARNAHAN AWAY

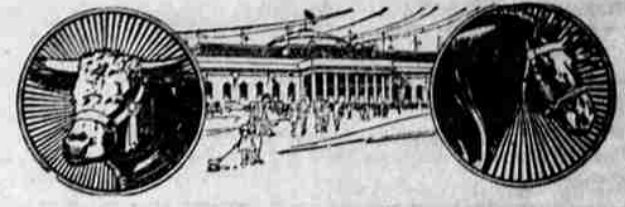
