KLAMATH COUNTY GETS PUBLICITY

Oregon Business Devotes Space to Development in This Section

New Road Would Cost Five Thousand

To respond to the plea of lumber workers and their employers for the improvement of the road from Chiloquin to the Forest Lumber company mill at Asp Grove, it would cost the county approximately \$5000. County Engineer Frank Z. Howard named this sum as an estimate on what the improvement would cost.

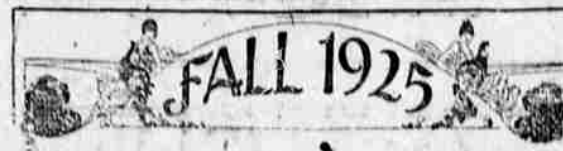
Whether or not the county is willing to undertake this expenditure is not known. The lumber operators at Asp Grove declare that unless the road is improved they will make their lumber community self-subsisting and that there will be no trade from their plant that will find its way to Chiloquin. Between the Chiloquin merchants and the lumbermen, considerable pressure is being brought to bear upon the county court to construct the improvement and put it through this fall in order that traffic may utilize it during winter months.

Teapot Dome Case Will Be Appealed To Highest Court

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Sept. 28.—Clyde M. Watts, deputy U. S. District Attorney for Wyoming, is to arrive in St. Louis, Mo., today with the record of appeal in the teapot dome naval reserve oil lease annulment suit.

The appeal will be filed in the eighth circuit court of appeals. It will write another chapter in the famous teapot dome lease which the government alleged in its suit here last spring that Harry F. Sinclair gained for his Mammoth Oil Company by "collusion and fraud" between Sinclair and the then secretary of the interior, Albert B. Fall.

Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy filed against the government in ever complaint debate, and government special oil counsel, headed by Owen J. Roberts and Alton Pomeroy, took an appeal.

Pending difficulty in the court of appeals the teapot dome issue continues in charge of receivers appointed by Judge Kennedy.
