Transportation and Possession Alleged Counts Against Local Resident

A pile of broken glass and an odor reminiscent of whiskey was silent testimony last evening to the arrest of Frank Moore, who was released this afternoon under \$1000 bond.

Moore was arrested on Main street between Second and Third streets, shortly after he had broken a gallon jug containing alleged moonshine whiskey. He was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Tom Tracy and Patrolman Morgan. A charge of possession and transporting intoxicating liquor and of breaking glass on the pavement has been preferred against him.

According to the arresting officers, Moore became suspicious about the time he was to be placed under arrest, and rushing to his car grabbed hold of a jug and smashed it on the pavement.
