

FRENCH EXPLAIN THEIR POSITION

Finance Minister Caillaux and Party Meet With U. S. Commission

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—(AP)—The French position in regard to her \$4,000,000,000 debt to the United States was argued again today by Finance Minister Joseph Caillaux in the third meeting of the French and American debt commissions.

Meeting at the treasury shortly after 10 o'clock, the two missions went into joint session, and less than 30 minutes was required to complete the business on hand.

It was apparent that most of the session was taken up by the French delegation in defense of its offer. When M. Caillaux and his colleagues left the treasury building, they declined to discuss the negotiations in any way.

9 Point Black

Tail Is Shot

One of Biggest Ever Brought Down Killed By Highway Man

A nine point black tail deer, a monster of its kind, was killed yesterday morning several miles west of Pinehurst by George Van Horn, maintenance engineer for the state highway department.

Van Horn, who resides near the summit of Green Springs mountain started his yesterday morning hunt near Tub Springs. He had not gone far before his attention was attracted by movements in the brush and then started and proud, with its wonderful set of horns, the black tail buck stepped forth. He was an easy shot and was easily killed by the hunter.

Tipping the scales at over 200 pounds, the deer is declared to be one of the largest of the black tail variety ever shot in this county.

2 GUARDS SHOT IN PRISON RIOT

LINCOLN, Neb., Sept. 28. (AP)—Two guards were shot at the Nebraska prison in a riot of prisoners late this afternoon, prison officials told local police in a hurry call for reinforcements to quell the rioters. Aid was rushed by the local police department to the prison which is located at Lancaster, a suburb about three miles from Lincoln. No further details could be learned from the prison by telephone. The rioting was still in progress at 3:30 p. m.

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FIRE REDUCTION GOAL OF CHIEFS IN SEATTLE MEET

Keith Ambrose Returns to This City After Attending Conference

Formal declaration of war against the fire menace in the United States was made last week by over five hundred members of the Pacific Coast Fire Chief's association in session at Seattle.

One of the five hundred who joined his hand and energies in the resolution to prevent fires was Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose, chief of the Klamath Falls department. Ambrose returned last night from Seattle where he has been attending the convention.

"The goal of the association is to cut the fire loss 100 million dollars this coming year and to reduce by five thousand the number of fatalities," Ambrose reported. "It is not an empty resolution, we felt, because a definite plan of action has been formulated to that end."

Jay Stevens, state fire marshal of California, detailed the plan to put it across. It is one of educa-

tion, the most effective checkmate to fire. He plans to secure the cooperation of all the civic and luncheon clubs in the United States and through that medium carry the message of fire prevention into every home.

"Last year the fire loss was \$548,000,000 and 15,000 people died from injuries incurred in fires."

Use of gasoline stoves by those who were not intimately cognizant of the dangers of gasoline was condemned by the fire chiefs.

"Few people realize that a lighted match near gasoline is just as liable to cause explosion or blaze as a match right in the liquid."

"For this reason and for the additional reason that most people do not know how to handle gasoline, the association expressed their disapproval of gasoline stoves."

The Seattle convention lasted four days and composed an open forum discussion on fire prevention research in which fire chiefs told of their problems and the manner in which they were solved.

MANY VISITORS AT CRATER LAKE

Registration for Season is Larger Than Last Year—Many There Sunday

Up until September 25 the registrations in Crater Lake National Park exceeded those of last year by over 2,000, according to the figures of L. E. Lamb, park ranger. Records show that the year of 1924 up until late September brought 62,500 people into the park, while this year 64,333 had registered.

Sunday brought over 300 people in, 200 making the trip for the first time this year while 100 were re-entries. Foreign cars registered from Tennessee, Illinois, Montana, Nevada, Indiana, Washington and California. 93 cars were registered with Ranger Lamb up until 5:30 last evening for the day.

Several parties who motored to the lake Sunday made the trip down to the lake, finding the trail in splendid condition, with no snow and a bright warm sun shining over

the water. With the exception of a few miles detour, which is now being made ready for paving, the road is in splendid condition.

BULGARIA AND JUGOSLAVIA REACH AGREEMENT ON TRANSFER OF MAIL

SOFIA.—(AP)—Negotiations which have extended over a prolonged period have resulted in the signing of a railroad operating convention by Yugoslavia and Bulgaria. It involves the transfer of mail from Bulgaria to Serbian trains and vice versa. In the agreement reached the railroad exchange center was left at Tsaribrod.

The railroad agreement was reached despite the fact that Serbia had suspended visaing or recognizing Bulgarian passports, owing to a protest lodged with the Bulgarian foreign office against the arrest of several Serbian subjects after the explosion in the cathedral of Sveta Nedelja. The controversy concerning the arrest has not yet been settled despite explanations and apologies offered by Christo Kalfoff, the Bulgarian Minister of Foreign Affairs.
