New Ford Body Is Big Improvement

The pronounced streamline of the improved Ford Touring Car is particularly accentuated in the higher radiator, the long sweep of the hood and cowl and the large crown fenders which come down well over both front and rear wheels. The body is longer, wider and sets 4 1/2 inches lower. Seats have been redesigned and are lower. There is greater leg room in the car. All four doors open forward and storm curtains are provided with uprights and open with the doors. The gasoline tank is under the cowl, permitting outside filling and easy access to the sediment bulb. Chassis include longer and more powerful brakes and other important mechanical improvements.

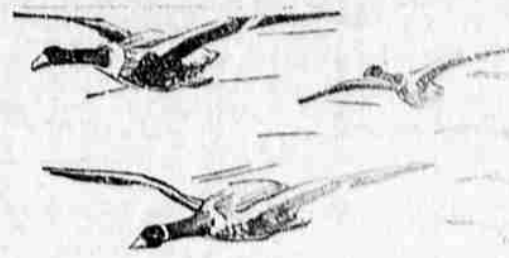

Chevrolet Breaks Own Sales Record

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 29.—The Chevrolet Motor Company has added another record to the series of sales and production marks established this year.

The new record is represented by the deliveries to Chevrolet dealers during August. A final check of August deliveries places the figures at 41,500, a larger number of cars than the company ever has placed with its dealers during any preceding August.

The August deliveries even exceeded those made during either June or July of this year.

The achievement of the August record preceded by only a few days production of the two-millionth car by the Chevrolet Motor company, the first manufacturer of selective gear shift automobiles to attain that figure.

Maintenance of deliveries through the summer months is cited by R. H. Grant, general sales manager of the Chevrolet Motor company, as

endorsement of his statement made several months ago that the automotive industry is approaching a more stable and uniform basis. "Eventually automobile production will be nearly uniform throughout the year," he said. "The seasonal peaks and valleys of production are being flattened out."
