**NUN OF FAR NORTH TRAVELS
 500 MILES TO FIND DENTIST**

REGINA, Sask., (AP)—For six days Sister Carrier of the Order of the Grey Nuns recently travelled 500 miles by canoe and train to Regina, primarily to see a dentist. She comes from that inland mission in the cold hinterland of Northern Saskatchewan, Notre Dame of the Sacred Heart, Beauval mission, five miles west of Lac la Plange. This is her first view of civilization in five years. Sister Carrier declared that she liked her mission so much that she would not like to be transferred to another, unless she was commissioned to go farther north, to work among the Eskimos. She was returning to her post after a short holiday with relatives here.

**AGED INDIAN QUITS HOSPITAL
 TO WALK EIGHTY MILES**

BANFF, Alta., (AP)—Eighty-year-old Peter Wisely, chief of the Norddegg branch of the Stoney Indians, dressed and departed from the Sarcee hospital, where he was confined for eye treatment, and walked to Morley, 80 miles, in two days. Fearing that the doctors in charge would not permit him to leave in order to bring his tribe through the mountains for the Indian celebration at Banff recently, he sneaked away early in the morning and walked across the prairies through the extreme heat, sleeping in the open and surviving on berries and water. He has only one eye left, and that does not serve him very well, but his Indian instinct carried him across country to his goal.
