MANY NEW HOMES

Up to yesterday afternoon permits for 49 new homes in Eugene were issued by W. H. Alexander, city building inspector, and the estimated value of all construction represented in the 88 permits issued for all kinds of buildings is over \$250,000, the inspector said yesterday.

Permits were issued for no large buildings this month, a large majority of them calling for new homes or remodeling of old ones. The largest permits were for additional expense in remodeling the Bank of Commerce building and for the erection of the "Light House" temple, started at the corner of Twelfth avenue west and Olive street.

Permits for two small dwellings were issued yesterday to E. G. Newman. One is at 2431 Potter street and the other at 2405 Potter street, each to cost \$1000.

A permit was issued to J. M. Younklin to remodel a building at 259 1/2 and 273 1/2 Tenth avenue west, at a cost of \$1000.—Eugene Register.
