**MILLION DOLLAR
JEWEL THEFT IS
REPORTED MADE**

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The New York Evening Telegram says \$1,000,000 worth of jewelry was stolen last night from the apartment of Mrs. Jessie Woolworth Donohue, daughter of the late Frank W. Woolworth at the Plaza hotel. The police department confirmed reports that detectives had been assigned to "a big jewel theft" at the hotel. The valuables stolen, the Telegram says, included a pearl necklace valued at \$450,000; a separate ring of pearls valued at \$250,000; assorted rings and brooches worth \$200,000 and other valuables to the amount of \$100,000.

The campaign is in charge of a committee including Senator Copeland, New York; Secretary Wilbur, Governor Erickson, Montana; Governor McMullen, Nebraska; President Leland, Stanford University; William Green, president American Federation of Labor; Charles Holbrook, Oregon, and others.
