Stewart's Daily Letter

WASHINGTON. — Maybe Frank Stutz, who directs publicity for the National association of Cleaners and Dyers, isn't altogether disinterested, in the blood curdling stories he tells of the dangers of cleaning things with gasoline. Maybe he wants to throw a scare into the public, so it will take its clothes to his association's members to be cleaned, instead of trying to clean them at home. Nevertheless some of his talk is interesting.

Isn't it safe enough if you keep it away from a light? I asked, in rejoinder to one of Frank's statements to the effect that a pint of gasoline and a pound of dynamite are about in the same class. "My, no," said Frank. "Gasoline is a dry liquid—"

"What do you mean, dry liquid?" I interrupted. "Dry like gin?" "I mean it's a liquid with no water in it," Frank explained. "That's why we say 'dry cleaning.' Like many dry liquids, gasoline's capable of producing electric sparks on being swished about. Didn't you ever notice that gasoline delivery wagons drag a chain along the ground? That's to carry off electric charges before they accumulate and blow 'em up."

"Rubbing together the surfaces of stuff like silk or wool will generate frictional electricity, too," Frank went on, "and in a dish of gasoline it's dangerous. It produces sparks, often a quarter of an inch long—equal to a 5000-volt spark. "If the air's damp enough and the stuff that is being cleaned is damp enough also, the spark is dissipated

and no harm is done. But if there's a little moisture about, as on hot, dry summer days, or cold, dry winter ones, the spark sets off the gasoline fumes, which are mighty potent with the correct proportion of air, and—wham! up you go."

"First class dry cleaning plants," related Stutz, "do their work in an atmosphere at least 55 per cent moistened. Sixty is better and some insist on 70 per cent.

"They take hourly moisture readings and whenever the air's water content falls below the safety mark it is artificially dampened at once. Even at that careful cleaners have all their vessel ground connected to carry off any electricity that may be generated despite their precautions."

TO OBSERVE "NAVY DAY" Plans are already under way for the celebration of "navy day" around Coos Bay, on October 27, according to Earl Murphy, secretary of the local chamber of commerce, who has received word from John H. Stevenson, chairman of the Oregon district for navy day, outlining the plan. Navy day, which is observed annually throughout the nation, is promoted by the Navy league of the United States. The idea of the occasion is to pay a tribute to the past and present services of the navy to the nation and to better acquaint the American people with what the navy means to them. At this same time it is the purpose of the league to observe the birthday of the late Theodore Roosevelt, who was born on the same date, October 27, Roosevelt, during his administrations did more than any other one man toward bringing the U. S. navy up to its present size and efficiency. Word was received that the navy department would no doubt assign certain naval vessels to Coos Bay for the occasion. The American Legion will probably participate along with other organizations of like kind and lunches, meetings and speeches will be had in honor of the day. Stevenson has written the mayors of North Bend, Marshfield, Coquille and Bandon, asking their aid and he has advised that some outstanding man be appointed chairman of the celebration.—Marshfield News.
