## 2 STATE PROHI OFFICERS HELD AS BOOTLEGGERS

Sons of Johnston Smith, former Prison Warden, in Serious Mixup

### RELEASED ON BONDS

### Prominent Democrats Come to Their Aid After Indictment is Served

Portland, Ore., Oct. 2.—(A.P.)—Robert Smith and A. C. Smith, said to be special prohibition agents of Governor Walter M. Pierce, were arrested here today on secret federal indictments and charged with conspiracy to violate the prohibition law, with seizing liquor and taking it for their own use, with demanding money to keep from making arrests of law violators, and with selling moonshine taken in a raid on a still in Marion county.

Robert and A. C. Smith are sons of former Warden Johnston Smith of the Oregon state penitentiary. They surrendered today to United States Marshal Hotchkiss and were released on \$2000 bail, posted by Milton A. Miller and Dr. J. W. Morrow.

Arthur Christensen, former federal prohibition agent and said to have been acting as special state agent in Astoria, was indicted on the same charges as those facing the Smith brothers. An additional charge of transportation of liquor was lodged against Christensen. Christensen was already under arrest on another charge and was put on \$500 bail. His bail was increased to \$2000 under the new charges.

## Ben Turpin's Wife Dies at Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Oct. 2.—(A.P.)—Ben Turpin's long vigil at the bedside of his invalid wife was at an end today. The motion picture comedian abandoned his work at the studio when Carrie LeMieux Turpin became seriously ill last December, and the call of the camera was unheeded month after month as he cared for the woman who would accept no other ministrations but his. Yesterday death ended her suffering. The Turpins were married in Chicago about 18 years ago and Mrs. Turpin worked with her husband on the legitimate stage and later in pictures. They were brought to Hollywood ten years ago by Charlie Chaplin.

## FIND TWO MORE BODIES OF MEN IN SUNKEN SUB

Divers Bring up Lifeless Forms of Victims of Recent Naval Tragedy

### ONE WASHED ASHORE

### Unidentified Body Found by Fisherman Today Off Stonington, Conn.

U. S. S. CAMDEN, off Block Island, Oct. 2. (Via wireless to (A.P.)—The toll of the known dead of the submarine S-51, was raised to four today when divers recovered the bodies of two of the crew in the engine room compartment of the ship.

The men were identified as Walter E. Lawson, electrician's mate, first class, Somerville, Mass., and B. D. Lindsay, engineer, second class, 527 Government St., Pensacola Fla.

The body of an officer or chief petty officer believed to have been washed overboard from the submarine S-51 a week ago tonight, was picked up by a fisherman in Kenyon wharf, in Stonington, Conn., today. An ambulance was sent to bring the body here. Identification was not made at Stonington.

## Will Make Use of Wild Range Horses

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 2.—(A.P.)—Wild horses, estimated to number a quarter of a million, ranging on the wild lands of the Pacific northwest, are to be rounded up and sent to Portland to be rendered into fertilizer and soap fats. ## KLAMATH TRIBE IS GIVEN LARGE PAYMENT TODAY

Nearly Quarter of a Million Dollars Allotted to Reservation Indians

### CHECKS ARE MAILED

### Supt. Arnold Starts Distribution of Money from Timber Land

Klamath Indians on the Klamath Indian reservation are \$249,600 richer today than they were yesterday as the result of the first government payment from timber sales made this year.

A check for \$200 was mailed to each of the 1245 Indians on the reservation by Leroy D. Arnold, superintendent of the reservation, today. No strings are attached to the payments, it was said. Each Indian may do with his money as he sees fit.
