**SAVANT WORKS ON ARTIFICIAL OYSTER BEDS**

BELLINGHAM, Wash. —(P)—The problem of artificial propagation of oysters may have been solved by Professor Trevor Kincaid of the University of Washington zoology department on the beds of Samish bay near here this summer. He has kept the young of eastern and Japanese oysters alive for two weeks and believes that the process can be worked out successfully.

The discovery would be a boon to Pacific coast oyster beds, most of which are in Puget Sound and in other inland waters of the state, local oyster growers say.

So far it has been necessary to import the seed of the bigger oysters from the Atlantic and Japan beds, as the cold water here would kill the spawn at once.

FREDERICKSBURG, Va. —(P)—Martin Davey, famous tree surgeon and congressman from Ohio, has volunteered his services in helping to save for posterity the last of the 13 horse chestnut trees which George Washington planted here to represent the 13 original colonies.

The tree, slowly dying because of its great age, and the inroads of the chestnut blight, is located on the property of John F. Scott, which was formerly a portion of the Kenmore estate, the home of Betty Washington Lewis, sister of George Washington. It has been viewed by thousands of visitors during the course of more than a century.

Congressman Davey has made a preliminary examination of the tree and stated that he would gladly undertake the work of ministering to its ills at his own expense. The cost of restoring the tree is estimated at about \$400.

**KOREAN PEERS NOW EMPLOYED AS CART PULLERS**

SEOUL, Korea. —The Korean nobility, with the exception of a few privileged peers, is reported to be suffering from extreme poverty. Several of the nobles, who were once wealthy, are now working as cart pullers and performing other menial tasks as the only means of escaping starvation.

At the time of the annexation of Korea by Japan, about 80 of the leading Koreans were created peers and given property by the Japanese government. Most of them ran through this property rapidly. Recently 30 of the impoverished Korean nobles sent a petition to the Japanese government asking for financial assistance.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 2.—Tillamook carried off first honors in cheese this year at the state fair with Mel-owest a close second. Competition was keen and the judges in the scoring found only a half point difference between the two well known Oregon brands.

Ralph Sutton won first prize with his cheese entry of Tillamook with a score of 96 1/2.

Reed Farmer, of Marshfield, won second prize with a score of 96 on his cheese. Hugh Barber, Tillamook factory, was third with a score of 95 3/4.

In the butter division, A. Lauber, of Portland, won first honors with a score of 95 3/4. P. Hettwer of Mt. Angel won second prize with a score of 95 1/2; A. A. Oswald, of Carver, won third with a score of 95 1/4.

**FIRST WOMAN MINISTER SINGS OF STATE ANTHEM**

COPENHAGEN. —(P)—Ever since Mistress Nina Bang became the first woman Danish minister, and as such also the head of the board of education, she has done the unexpected and startling.

First the singing of the national anthem was banned, which she claimed was too war-like to benefit the public good. And when despite her prohibition, the anthem was inadvertently sung in a theatre in which she happened to be, the minister remained seated and moreover pulled her colleagues of the cabinet back into their seats by their coat-tails.

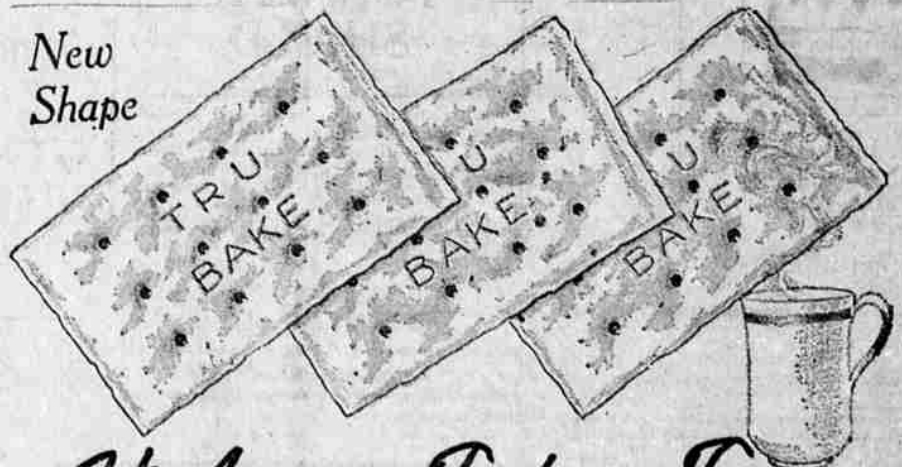
