### Hunting Army Is Doubled In Twelve Months

#### Twice as Many Licenses Issued September 1925

Two Klamath hunters tread the carpeted terrain of the forests and the marshes of the low lands this fall where only one sought deer and game birds last year. This startling disclosure was revealed this morning with the announcement of the number of hunting licenses sold in Klamath Falls during September of this year as compared to the number sold last September. The number of hunters has doubled in one year, if the hunting license record is a means of judging.

The number of hunting licenses sold in Klamath Falls the past month is 956, it was announced this morning by Loyd R. De Lap, circuit court clerk. The number sold in September of last year is 409.

Money realized from the sale of game licenses during September of 1925 was \$3111.50; in 1924, it was \$1599.50.
