"Why Have Fires At All?" Chief Asks Rotarians

"Why not reduce it to nothing?" Rotarians were asked that question yesterday noon when Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose gave an address on fire prevention.

The point of the fire chief's remarks was that during the first eight months of last year, the fire loss was approximately \$35,000 and three persons in Klamath Falls were killed from fire. The first eight

months of this year, not one person was killed or badly injured, and the fire loss has been but \$600.

"Ninety five per cent of your fires are caused from carelessness," the fire chief exclaimed. "Klamath Falls is to be congratulated on its record so far this year, but why have any fires at all? Why doesn't everybody use exceptional care and caution and we will be able to cut this annual fire loss down to practically nothing."

Ambrose outlined to Rotarians the national campaign undertaken by the Pacific Coast Fire Chiefs' association for the cutting down of the fire loss in the United States.

HEAVY FINES ARE LEVIED IN SEPT.

Two Thousand Dollars Is Total Fines for Liquor Law Violations

Approximately \$2000 is the lump sum representing fines assessed in September for liquor violations in justice court. But the entire sum representing fines is not in the treasury. At \$2 a day, a number of the violators are serving their fines out in jail. Fifteen men were brought before Justice of the Peace Ed Kendall for disobeying some feature of the prohibition laws during September.

CONSTRUCTION OF COMMUNITY BUILDING IS AIM

Henley to Start Soon on Foundations of Community Center Structure

A place to gather and discuss current events, a place to dance, a place to conduct athletic contests, in short, a community building for Henley will be in process of construction within a week it was announced last night at a meeting of the Central Community club.

Four thousand dollars will be expended by the members of the Central community club, comprising not only Henley district but adjacent districts, and a structure that will adequately serve the needs of the agricultural community, is planned.

Decision to construct the community structure was made many months ago and farmers and livestockmen of the region agreed and signed up to purchase stock. Then the growing season came on and all were busy with the crops. With approach of winter and a consequent cessation of intensive work, it has been decided to collect the money signed up and push through the new building as rapidly as possible. It is expected it will be ready for official opening before winter snows fly.
