PORTER AWARDED JOB BY LEGION

Memorial Building to be Built Immediately at low Cost; Bid \$23,406.67

Ground will be broken this week for the construction of the American Legion Memorial building by the Porter Construction company, to whom was let the contract Saturday, for the construction of the structure for the exceptionally low price of \$23,406.67.

The structure on the south east corner of the court house block will be completed by Christmas day. Louis K. Porter, president of the construction company, assured the legion committee and the county court Saturday. Cornerstone for the building will be laid with appropriate ceremonies on Armistice day, November 11.

So low was Porter's bid that the committee and court, did not even consider three other bids that the submitted by the Concrete Pipe company, Cofer Bros., and W. A. Stevens. Before bids on the building were opened, Porter had assured the legion, of which he is an active member, that he would bid on the building at cost. His promise was kept Saturday, it turned out, as Porter under bid the three others by from two to four thousand dollars.

Howard R. Ferrin, well known local architect, drew the plans for the building and will act in a supervisory capacity in its construction.

To furnish more room for a basketball floor, the committee Saturday arranged with the contractor for a six by eight foot increase in the athletic floor.

The building will include the athletic floor, legion dressing rooms and showers for women upstairs and showers for the men downstairs.

The new building will solve a long felt need of Klamath Falls. It will provide a place where indoor athletics can be carried on, where amateur plays can be staged and where the American legion can carry on its activities in its own building.

Edw. Kellogg Is Winner In Divorce Suit

Husband Gets Large Property Settlement In Decree

Edward Kellogg is several thousand dollars richer today as the result of a divorce decree handed down this morning by Judge A. L. Leavitt.

She who first instituted the suit, Mrs. Edna Kellogg, is the loser.

The decree denied Mrs. Kellogg's suit for divorce and granted Mr. Kellogg's counter suit for divorce. It allowed Mr. Kellogg the sum of \$2495, which he had claimed he loaned to Mrs. Kellogg for the apartment house, and gave him a one-third interest in the apartment house and Ashland property.

Judge Leavitt found in his decree that Mrs. Kellogg's claims that her husband was a habitual drunkard and failed to support her were not based on fact.
