BEETS MAY SUPPLANT SUGAR CANE IN LOUISIANA

BATON ROUGE, La.—Sugar cane, long a staple crop in Louisiana, may lose its eminence in the list of the state's agricultural products, if suc-

cessful. Cane crops have been beset by many plagues, the most recent being the borer and proving serious. Mosaic disease and root rot also have attacked cane. Sugar planters have asked that the sugar house at the new Louis-

iana State University be provided with machinery for refining beet sugar as a part of the experiment planned next year. More than 100 acres of sugar beets will be planted in various sections of the "sugar belt" of Louisiana next year.
