KYLE DEFEATED FOR THIRD TERM

Wilford Allen of Grants Pass Elected Head of Irrigation Congress

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Oct. 8. (AP)—Wilford Allen, of Grants Pass, was elected president of the Oregon Irrigation Congress at the concluding session of the annual meeting here last night. He defeated James M. Kyle, of Stanfield, who has been president for two years. The vote was Allen 163, Kyle 157. W. T. Power, of Oregon Agricultural College was elected secretary, succeeding Walter E. Meacham.

The fight against Kyle was led by Ralph Cowgill, of Medford, who headed a group of Medford people. He was supported by Percy Cupper, former state engineer.

A resolution was adopted urging the state securities commission to require every district whose interest on bonds has been guaranteed by the state to employ a colonization agent. Rhea Loper, state engineer, declared that only 3699 families would be required to complete settlement of every district.

Concerning the proposal of secretary of the Interior Work that the state should cooperate financially in developing projects, the congress adopted a resolution saying the state had no power under the constitution or otherwise to cooperate financially in aiding settlers on federal reclamation undertakings.

Approval was given the proposal of Dr. Work that repayment must be made to the reclamation fund of the annual charges due from existing projects.

Other resolutions called for the appointment of a committee to make a complete survey of the irrigation situation in Oregon, to report back at the next annual conference, resolutions endorsing the making of Crescent City a harbor of refuge and shipping port, and a resolution approving the Oregon state development fund.

GOVERNMENT TO LEVY ON UNIMPROVED LAND

HAVANA.—Under the new public works law all idle land in the republic will be taxed, affecting in the city of Havana alone about 40,000 vacant lots and in the republic thousands of acres of land that either never have been under cultivation, or allowed to lie idle by owners.

This is the first time in the history of the republic, it is believed that taxes have been assessed on idle lands. Formerly taxes were assessed on actual income, which prevented collection of taxes against unproductive holdings.

The Public Works Department has announced that six per cent of the valuation would be considered as income from non-income paying lands and property, or \$1.20 on each \$1,000 taxable value.

MCCORMACK ATTRACTS TWO BIG AUDIENCES IN DUBLIN

DUBLIN.—John McCormack's two concerts in the theatre Royal Dublin recently were attended by the largest audiences ever assembled in the city for similar events. Not only was every inch of available space occupied, but parts of the building in which no place had previously been found for the public were used and sold at high prices.

The governor-general, the president, and all the high officers of the state were present at both concerts.

GERMAN BEER PRODUCTION HALVED

KARLSRUHE.—(AP)—The consumption of alcoholic beverages in Germany is much less than in pre-war days, notwithstanding the annulment of the majority of the restrictions imposed during the inflation period. The production of beer now is only about 50 per cent that of former days.

DEVELOPMENT PROJECT STARTED

Approximately 800,000 Acres of Land to Be Placed in Cultivation

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The extensive holdings of Miller and Lux, Inc., comprising approximately 800,000 acres of California land, are to be divided and placed under cultivation, a syndicate of bankers announced here.

Cultivation and development of the properties, estimated to be worth \$50,000,000, will be brought about through the issuance of \$25,000,000 in bonds during the first part of next week by the syndicate headed by Pierce, Fair and Company, and Blyth, Witter and Company.

The Miller and Lux company also own 200,000 acres of uncultivated land in Oregon and Nevada which is to be included in the development plan.

Practically all of the properties have remained idle since their acquisition by the late Henry Miller, cattle and land baron, from Spanish grantees during the early days of California.
