Ambassador Crowley has a monologue which starts the audience laughing the moment he steps from the wings, and the laughing raises to a gale of laughter and applause before he stumbles off the stage.

A pair acrobats on rings and bars close the program with some daring aerial work. The girl is pleasing to look at, which adds materially to the success of their number.

**AUSTRALIAN STATES WANT THEIR GOVERNORS TO BE NATIVE BORN**

SYDNEY, N. S. W.—(P)—The several states of Australia have decided that in the future they want only native born Australians as state governors. A memorial is being prepared by New South Wales, as the mother state, asking the home authorities for the appointment in the future of Australian-born citizens to governorship posts.

In addition to New South Wales this policy has been approved by Queensland, Tasmania, South Australia and West Australia. It is expected that the state of Victoria also will favor it.

The card was definitely set today for Tuesday, Oct. 20. Sylvester was forced to postpone the card until that date because of his inability to come to terms with De Pinto. The flashy Portland lightweight wanted all the receipts and a few courthouses thrown in.

Another wire to the matchmaker brought word that Carl Stola will be here Sunday from Bend to train for his 6-round go with Chuck Sams in the 6-round semi-windup.

Wilbur Harrington, the hard-hitting Klamath Indian will meet Kid Alcorn in a four-rounder, Carl Floyd and Jimmie Solomon will tangle for four rounds, while Syl-

vester probably will get another four-round curtain raiser.

"I've seen both Starkey and De Pinto, and I can absolutely guarantee that the fans of this city will say it was the best fight they ever saw in their lives," declared Sylvester today. "Those two boys will get them standing up right from the start and keep 'em there until the fight is over."

After several days of negotiations, Sylvester procured a lease on the Scandinavian hall and will now have more time to devote toward giving Klamath fans some real boxing bouts.

### POLAND WANTS TO DRINK ITS BOOZE ON SUNDAY, TOO

**WARSAW**—(P)—The Polish government has prohibited the sale of alcoholic beverages from 3 p.m. on Saturday until 10 a. m. Monday. An exception to the decree is beer with a maximum of two and one half percent alcohol.

### PREVIOUS TAMPERING INDICATED IN ANCIENT TOMB RECENTLY FOUND

**MOSCOW**—(P)—Discoveries made by Koslov, the explorer, in the excavation of an imperial tomb near Urga, Mongolia, has intensified the interest of archeologists in that part of Asia. The tomb which Koslov excavated apparently had been tam-

pered with in past centuries, but contained many interesting objects which led to the conclusion that the burial took place 2,000 B. C.

Two pieces of thick carpet were ornamented with pictures of an elk, a winged lynx, a bull and a leopard. There were traces of varnish and paint on the tomb, and the interior was draped with silk, richly ornamented with the figures of winged riders and reindeer. A corpse was found in a sitting posture in the corridor of the tomb and the fragments of clothing smelled strongly of camphor.
