Cattle Selling Association Active in Finding Buyers for Members

In three and four car load lots, fat Klamath cattle are leaving their habitat on the fertile Klamath grazing land for California markets. Under the supervision of the California Cattlemen's Association, buyers for members of the association have been secured and the shipments supervised by the association.

Among the shipments of this week are the following: Eight car loads of fat cows sold by W. C. Dalton to the C. Swanson & Son company of Sacramento; three car loads of cows from the Campbell and Wilkerson ranches in Langell valley, sold to the Globe Packing company of Los Angeles; three car loads of cows from the Baron and Dunn ranches of Fort Klamath, sold to the Allan and Pyle Packing company of San Francisco.

Next week, eight more cars of steers will be shipped by W. C. Dalton to C. Swanson company of Sacramento and eight cars of steers will be shipped from the Kittridge ranch, at Lenz station north of Chiloquin.

ALABAMA BOY ENABLED TO SCHOOL AND EQUIP HIMSELF

GADSDEN, Ala.—(AP)—Every boy in Alabama has opportunity to equip himself with an education and to become self-supporting.

For the boy of limited means and in such financial circumstances as to require him to become a quick producer, the state has established the Alabama School of Trades and Industries, a state-endowed institution to train craftsmen. Added to craftsmanship will be such cultural advantages as may be speedily absorbed.

The school will teach a boy to become a skilled worker, a carpenter,

a cabinet maker, a bricklayer, a printer, an artist, an engineer, a mechanic, a motorist or any of the other allied trades.

The first unit of the dormitory system is complete. Others will be built as the plant is completed. The shops embrace all needed machinery and skilled instructors compose the faculty. The entire plant is super-modern.

BERLIN HAS ONE SALOON OR RESTAURANT TO EACH 250

BERLIN.—Statistics show that the city of Berlin contains 16,360 restaurants and saloons. This represents a proportion of one public house for every 250 inhabitants. As most of these restaurants or saloons are located in the city proper, the proportion is really one to 116. The suburb of Steglitz can boast of being the most temperate of all Greater Berlin's districts. For here the proportion is but one public house to every 428 inhabitants.
