Watermaster Closes Headgates to Melhase Canal in Upper Klamath Basin

Headgates of the Melhase canal irrigating approximately 2500 acres of land in the Fort Klamath country, have been closed and will remain closed until the ranchers of that section make some provision toward taking care of waste water.

This was the statement today of Watermaster Joseph Jensen, who closed the head gates. Mr. Jensen first advised the ranchers of that section by letter and a short time after, called on them personally, telling them to dig a waste water ditch in order to eliminate the nuisance of waste water flooding roads and adjoining lands.

According to the watermaster, the advice was not followed and the only course open was to close the headgates. Mr. Jensen suggests the digging of a canal running north and south through the affected territory.

So abundant is irrigation water in the upper Klamath country that care of the waste water has become a problem. When not taken care of the waste water fills up barrow pits of roads and seeps onto land of adjoining ranches.
