SEVERAL LIQUOR VENDORS NABBED

State and county officers, headed by L. L. McBride of the state prohibition force, located a still of 25 gallons capacity, 70 gallons of moonshine, eight barrels of mash and other evidences of wholesale moonshining operations in a house near Pelican City. Arthur Brown was arrested as the owner of the still and liquor. He is still being held in the county jail today pending a justice court hearing some time this week.

Frank Gasnon, alias Riley, was caught with liquor in his possession Saturday night for the second time within two weeks, and paid a \$400 fine after pleading guilty to a possession charge before Justice of the Peace Kendall. His first offense cost him a fine of \$200. Raising officers headed by L. L. McBride found five gallons in his room on 10th street.

Mrs. Rose Randall paid a fine of \$200 after pleading guilty this morning to a charge of selling liquor in her house on south Eighth street. Raising officers procured but a small amount of liquor.

Jack Miller, former Klamath county jailer, was nabbed on the old Shippington road with a 10 gallon keg of moonshine in his car. The car had broken down and Miller was attempting to fix it when the officers drove by and searched it. Miller entered a plea of guilty in the court of Justice of the Peace, Kendall this morning and paid a \$500 fine.

Find No Trace of Lone Highwayman

Police today had found no trace of the lone highwayman who was reported to have held up Melvin Buell at a lonely spot on Manzanita street late Saturday night. Buell, a night operator at the Union Oil company station at Sixth and Klamath, reported the loss of \$200 of company funds.

Buell told police that the foot-pad was masked and carried a revolver. He thought he had been followed from the station after he had closed it for the night.

Famous Escadrille May Be Dissolved; Yanks Do Good Work

FEZ, French Morocco, Oct. 12. (AP)—Approaching dissolution of the Sherifian Escadrille, composed of American aviators volunteering for service against the Moroccan rebels, was announced today in an official communication.

"This escadrille," the communique says, "now is reaching the end of its activities. Its members have shown themselves worthy of their great reputations."

"A number of other escadrille will be moved to Algeria at an early date."

"Yesterday they bombarded El-Abd-Krim's own stronghold, Ain Berda, in the heart of the Beni Cargel country. The town lies at the base of a precipitous mountain system and is strongly entrenched. The aviators were greeted with heavy volleys but flew close to the ground and destroyed several blockhouses."

"Dr. V. Sparks of Indianapolis narrowly escaped when the engine of his machine failed directly over the Rifian stronghold. Just as he seemed doomed to capture, he got the machine working and escaped."

SEARCH WARRANT RULING IS MADE
