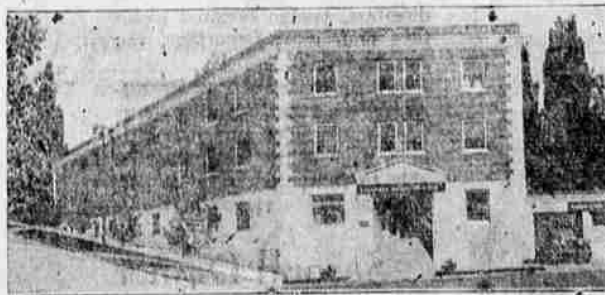
MRS. WILLITS TO RETURN Attends Last Rites of Aged Mother At Talent

Mrs. L. E. Willits is expected to return home the later part of this week from Talent where she was called on Saturday by the death of her aged mother, Mrs. Catherine K. Alford. Mrs. Alford was one of the oldest pioneers of Jackson county, having crossed the plains by ox team, westward bound, with friends, her parents being dead in 1850, locating in Linn county. She was born in Missouri in 1838. Besides Mrs. Willits, she leaves three other children, R. A. Alford of Klamath Falls, M. L. Alford of Medford and Mrs. C. W. Walters of Talent. During her life she was a devout member of the Baptist church, in which she took an active part until a few years ago when her health commenced to fail.
