JAILBIRD LABOR TO BE USED UPON LEGION BUILDING

County Court Agrees to Allow County Prisoners to Help Porter

Another short cut to economy in the construction of the American Legion building was taken yesterday afternoon with the agreement of the county court to furnish the Porter Construction company with prison labor.

Contract for the new public building, to be built on Fourth and Klamath, corner of the court house block, was formally let to the Porter Construction company last night by the county court, and preliminary work on the structure started this morning.

Prisoners in the county jail will be employed in the digging of the foundations and other jobs that do not require experienced construction workers.

If possible, the building will be sufficiently completed on November 11 for the corner stone laying exercises on Armistice day.

It is hoped to have the structure completed by Christmas day.
