WOMAN'S CLUB DONATES

The Roseburg Woman's Club in its regular meeting appropriated the sum of \$500 from its treasury to aid the library board in the purchase of new books. In spite of the fact that the club is giving a great deal of thought to its financial condition, preparing to start work soon on a new club house, the women have always been very active in their support of the library, their club house site having originally been offered to the city as a site for a library building. In continuing this support they are working to increase the volume of books and the appropriation made in their meeting will be used for that purpose.

Plans for the construction of their building are proceeding rapidly and their bond issue will soon be floated. Attorney Carl Wimberly has been retained as attorney in the legal affairs in connection with the bond issue, which will be in the sum of \$15,000 and which will be used for the construction of the proposed building.
