#### Klamath High School Meets Medford on fair grounds Field Tomorrow

In a desperate effort to counteract the loss of Hall, star Klamath back field man, Coach Dwight French has switched his line and back field and a line-up, hitherto not seen by Klamath rooters, will face Medford Saturday afternoon on Fair grounds field.

Carl Yancey, who has been waverly at times but usually a good ground gainer, has been placed at right end. He has been replaced by Zed Barnes, whose showing in practice this week has been nothing short of remarkable.

Bessler, if he can throw off the effects of La Grippe, will replace Morgan at left tackle and it is a toss-up as to whether Connors or McGuire will start at right guard.

#### Hit is Out

Hall, Coach French admitted today, was out of it. He is suffering from a severe bone bruise of the right hip, incurred the second quarter of the Asbland game last Saturday.

"He may get in for a few minutes but I doubt whether he will last," the coach said. "I am hoping above hope that Bessler will be in good enough shape. His showing at Grants Pass, during the first five minutes of play before he had to retire because of injuries, was great. He simply tore the Grants Pass line to shreds. Both Hall and Bessler are excellent college material. With those two fellows in the game would say that Klamath would defeat Medford. With both out, it is pretty hard to predict. Perhaps it gives them a little bit of an edge, but at that we have a splendid chance to wipe out the first defeat."

#### CANADIAN HORSES ROUNDED UP TO PROVIDE MEAT IN EUROPE

REGINA, Sask. (AP)—A syndicate was in the Western Canada market this summer for 50,000 horses to be shipped to Belgium, France and other European countries for human consumption. George Pootmans of this city headed the syndicate.

Pootmans said he would buy all types and sizes or even crippled horses just so they had no organic diseases. Great numbers of wild horses roaming the ranges in the southern part of Saskatchewan were to be captured and used. Pootmans declared that he would have to purchase the bulk of his 50,000 order at a rate of \$3 a head to make the venture successful.
