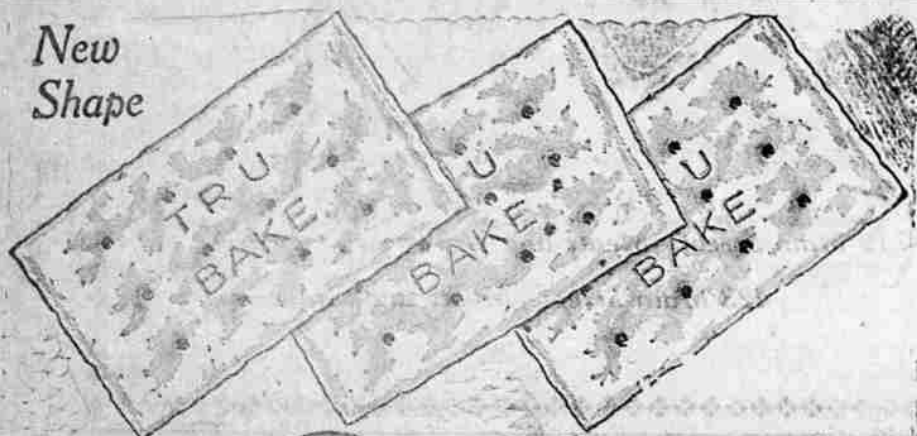

COST OF LIVING IN ITALY SHOWS STEADY INCREASE FOR 11 YEARS

ROME.—(AP)—Cost of living in Italy has been on the increase constantly since 1914 and is still mounting, recently published statistics show. Taking 100 as an index figure in 1914, the cost of living has reached 498.22.

A table of prime necessities of life, including bread, spaghetti, rice, beef, bacon, milk, potatoes and olive oil, shows an average rate compared with the index figure of 432.98 in December, 1923; 492.29 in December, 1924, and 498.22 in June, 1925.

A. F. O. L. RAPS RAIL LABOR ACT

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 16.—(AP)—The American Federation of Labor at its concluding session today, voiced its condemnation of the transportation act and the railroad labor board. The board, said a committee report, no longer has the regard or respect of any political party and "its abolishment would be but the painless excision of a dead and withered appendix."

It was voted to urge union organization not to permit the promotion of social legislation to supersede the trade union's own purpose of fostering self reliance and self help.

The federation voted to ask its execution council to continue organization work.

An investigation of the Bell Telephone system was urged. The company, said a report, "has a monopolistic grip on a vital public service and has become, year by year, more arrogant, more arbitrary and more detrimental to the progress and welfare of the country."
