FUGITIVE GIVES SELF UP; FACES MURDER CHARGE

William H. Turner Comes Back from Germany and Will Face the Music

HAS STRANGE STORY

Says he Knows Nothing of Death of 2 Men—Wife Got His Insurance

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—(AP)—William H. Turner, former coal mine foreman of feudist Pike county, Kentucky, tired of being "dead" in Germany, is back in this country to face charges of murdering the unidentified mine worker whose tombstone bears Turner's name.

He also is accused of the murder of Henry Wilson, another mine worker killed in a mysterious explosion in a coal mine at McCarr, Kentucky. The fatal explosion was considered an accident, until Turner, who blames other for the affair, got homesick in Hamburg and wrote to a Kentucky friend a letter that reached the authorities.

Arrested at Once

When Turner, under weight from short rations and, with his belongings in a papier-mache suitcase, stepped off the gang plank of the steamer Resolute, arriving from Hamburg yesterday, he was greeted by Taylor Hatfield, one of the famous feudist clan and a deputy sheriff of Pike county. Hatfield showed Turner a warrant for his arrest.

Mrs. Turner, who has been living in Trenton, N. J., with her five children since she and Turner's sister, Mrs. F. F. Farley of Coral Gables, Fla., collected \$65,000 after Turner's supposed death, said she had thought her husband dead and had been bringing her children up in that belief.

She said she had no part in identification of the body.

Relative Also Held

In Williamson, W. Va., Joe Jacks, Turner's father-in-law, who was an electrician for the Auburn mine at the time of the explosion last January, had been arrested on a murder charge also.

"We were blasting through gravel to a new cut," Turner began his story to Hatfield and New York police yesterday. "Henry Wilson and some other men were setting dynamite charges. I was in another part of the mine."

Ordinarily, according to Turner, it is a safe and simple thing to attach wires to a dynamite charge, but the circuit must have been closed and the explosive went off as soon as the wires touched it. Wilson and his companion were blown to pieces.

Says He Was Drunk

"I didn't know anything about it," continued Turner. "A brother-in-law of mine took me out to drink some white mule. He wouldn't let me go where any one could see me. He kept making me drink and when I was good and drunk, he pulled a gun on me and said I would have to get out of town and stay out. He told me where to go and what to do. I went."

The remains of Wilson were identified, and when Turner's absence continued for several days, the other body, badly mangled, but about the right weight and measurements, was identified as his. An insurance company paid his "widow" and his sister his insurance without protest.

Went to Norway

Turner went to Columbus, Ohio, and thence to New York, where he was met by his father-in-law, Joe Jacks, who had tickets for Norway.

From Norway Turner went to Hamburg.

"I got sick of hearing German and no American all the time," explained Turner, and, "not getting enough work or enough food, I just decided to write home and find out what it was all about and get in touch with my wife."

The friend to whom he wrote hurried with the letter to the sheriff and shortly afterwards the grand jury brought indictments against Turner and Jacks.

Union Oil To Construct New Klamath Plant

Wholesale Center Soon To Go Up In Chiloquin

Construction of a Union Oil Co. wholesale distributing plant at Chiloquin was announced today by C. C. Colvin, Klamath manager of the oil concern. Work on the plant will begin Monday morning, October 26, and it will be completed in 30 days.

Many thousands of dollars will be involved in the expansion move of the oil company in Klamath, it was said. It will include two large storage tanks, with a total capacity of 46,000 gallons, two oil trucks to be used this fall and a third to be added to the plant force next spring, and loading and unloading facilities.

"In other words," Mr. Colvin explained this morning, "it will be merely a typical wholesale oil plant, similar to many that you see in Klamath."

"The move is to meet the natural and steady development that has been enjoyed by our company since its entrance into this territory. Our figures show that the time has come when such a plant in Chiloquin would benefit our company and our customers, so we are going ahead with the project."

No announcement of who will be in active charge of the new plant will be forthcoming until later, Mr. Colvin said.

CUYLER IS HERO IN SMOKY CITY

It was His Crash in Eighth Which Gave the Pirates World Championship

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Oct. 16.—(AP)—Popular opinion may set up Hazon (Kiki) Cuyler as the outstanding hero of the Pirates over the Senators in the 1925 world series, for it was his mighty blow in the pinch that won the seventh and deciding game, but an analysis of the records fails to bring out any surprisingly prominent figure such as was Bucky Harris in the triumph of Washington a year ago.

Cuyler not only struck the deciding blow yesterday, but his home run clinched his second game for the Buccaneers, while his fielding was frequently sensational. Nevertheless the remarkable all-around work of Pie Traynor, bright third sacker of the new champions; the spectacular hitting and base running of the veteran Max Carey; and the stellar twirling of Vic Aldridge and Ray Kremer also figured largely in the Pittsburgh victory. For Washington, the most conspicuous work included Johnson's bright pitching in his first two starts; Sam Rice's startling defensive work, particularly his catch off Smith in the third game as well as his consistent batting; and the slugging of Goose Goslin, and Joe Harris who was the most dangerous man in the Senator attack in the pinches.

EXPERIMENTS PROVE EFFICIENCY LAGS UNDER HIGH TEMPERATURES

ERIVAN.—(AP)—Science has come to the aid of the man who does not want to work in hot weather. Experiments carried out by the Near East Relief among the 15,000 children in its orphanage schools and workshops here prove that mental and physical efficiency are seriously lowered when the temperature rises above 73 degrees.

The experiments covered summer temperatures ranging from 65 degrees to 90 degrees Fahrenheit. Maximum efficiency in classroom or workshop is secured under temperatures of 67 to 73 degrees. The human machine's ability to work effectively decreases rapidly as the temperature rises above 73. At a temperature of 90 degrees, the number of mistakes increases by 62 per cent.

McCAMPBELL AND TODD CONVICTED

MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 16.—William McCampbell and Wm. Todd of Klamath county, charged with the violation of the possession clause of the national prohibition act, were found not guilty by a jury in the federal court Thursday afternoon.

The pair appeared before Federal Judge Wolverton this morning for sentence. Both were given fines of \$500—the maximum for the first offense, under the federal law. McCampbell was given until tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock to raise the fine. Todd admitted his inability to gather so much money on short notice and will serve it out in federal prison.

McCampbell, besides the \$500 fine was ordered to pay the government the cost of subpoenaing and calling four witnesses from Klamath county.
