## Tragic Air Crash Ends Pilgrimage

WADHURST, Sussex, England, Oct. 17. (AP)—A sad ending has come to a holy year pilgrimage by an American family to Rome in the death in an airplane accident to one of the party and serious injuries to two others.

In the crash of a large Goliath airplane in which they were traveling from London to Paris, Miss Katherine Burke, of New York, sustained injuries from which she died shortly afterwards, her brother, Monsignor Daniel Burke, pastor of the church of St. Philip, Neri, of New York, suffered a compound fracture of the leg, and Joseph Burke, another brother, had both his feet injured and his scalp lacerated.

## Stand Collapses; Several Injured

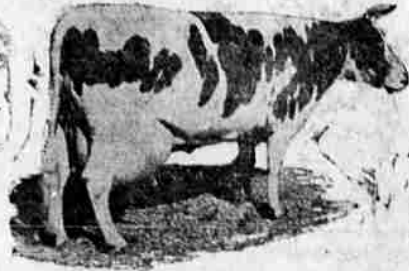
WASHINGTON, Penn., Oct. 17.—(AP)—The east end of wooden grandstand at the Washington and Jefferson football grounds collapsed this afternoon at the outset of the W. and J. "Carnegie" game. About one hundred spectators were buried in the debris. First reports were that three persons had received broken legs and arms.

## BULL DEMOLISHES PLANE FORCED DOWN IN PASTURE

SOIGNIES, Belgium.—(AP)—An infuriated bull vented its ire upon a disabled airplane recently and when the animal concluded that its job had been done the machine was beyond repair. The airplane carrying eight passengers from Paris to Brussels was forced down by a defective motor and landed in a pasture 15 miles from Brussels. The bull, aroused by the chugging of the motor, made straight for it, while the pilot and passengers jumped out and made their escape in a mad rush across the field. The animal charged the machine again and again and kept at his work of destruction until the passengers got out of the danger zone.

## Dairy Cow Testing and Feeding Demonstration

These cows will give about 4000 pounds of milk per year, which is about Oregon's standard and the standard of the United States.

## Steamer Tries to Cancel First Disaster News

BOSTON, Oct. 17.—(AP)—The steamer City of Rome tried to cancel her first message relative to the submarine S-51 and the loss of 33 lives off Buck Island on September 25. Whitcomb P. Child, radio operator for the Tropical radio company, testified here today before the naval inquiry.

The witness, who intercepted the first message sent out by the City of Rome following the disaster testified he immediately notified the Boston navy yard operator that the S-51 was in distress.

The commandant of the navy yard he testified, then radioed through his station to the City of Rome and added: "Have you rammed S-51? Give exact position and details."

This message, Curie said, was sent out by the navy yard operator at 2:10 a. m. daylight time, on September 26.

That Ager drove 1250 sheep over 750 acres during the grain growing period and destroyed wheat, hay and verdure to the damage of \$3500 to the California concern, is the claim of the plaintiff.

The alleged damage to the land took place between the months of January and April of this year, the complaint states. The California land concern is represented by W. C. Van Emon, local attorney.
