Pendleton Man To Enter Race

Frederick Steiwer Will Seek U. S. Senatorship

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 19.—Frederick Steiwer, prominent Pendleton attorney, has made his preliminary announcement that he will be a candidate for the nomination of United States senator in the primaries next spring. Steiwer states that he will announce his platform later.

In his preliminary announcement he states that support of President Coolidge, decreased taxation, economy, law enforcement, development of the Columbia river and the retention of shipping board ships by the government will come in for a portion of his program.

Steiwer is the second man from Umatilla county to announce his intention to run for the senatorial nomination, the other being A. R. Shumway, at present joint representative from Umatilla and Morrow counties. Mr. Shumway is a big rancher operating near Milton.

CHAS. MAGUIRE COMING HOME

After Two Years in East at School Is Returning to Old Home

Charles B. Maguire, second son of J. F. Maguire, Sr., who for the past two years has been studying in the east, will return to Klamath Falls this week to reside.

Mr. Maguire, Sr., plans to leave tomorrow morning for Portland where he will join his son, Dick Maguire, who is attending school at Mount Angel, will join his father and brother and the three will spend several days in Portland. They plan to attend the California-Oregon football game at Multnomah field.

During their stay in the northern city Dick will receive medical attention for his broken nose which he suffered in a boxing bout at the academy several weeks ago.

Culvert Contract To Be Let Today By County Court

Unless there is another unfortunate mix-up like that which characterized the first opening of bids, the contract for culverts for the county during 1925 will probably be let this afternoon by the county court.

There are but two bids to be considered, one by the Fenotti Machinery company and another by the Pacific Coast Culvert and Flume company, both of Portland. A third bid which was wired in Saturday afternoon when the court opened the bids, by the Western Concrete Pipe company of San Francisco, was rejected because no certified check accompanied the bid.

When the bids were first opened, it was found that the Fenotti concern had not included a certified check with their offer. Their competitor, the Pacific Coast Culvert company, intervened and insisted that its bid was the only one that could be considered, as it had adhered to all the requirements.

The county court, secure in its power to "reject any or all bids" threw all the bids out and announced they would re-advertise. The result of the second advertisement was opened Saturday afternoon.

CAPTURED DUCKS FROM LAKE ARE BEING OBSERVED

An enclosed pen, housing 30 sick ducks, caught the latter part of last week in Tule lake by U. S. Game Warden George Tonkin, has been established on the property of the California Oregon Power company west side power plant.

With fresh running water, many of the ducks are showing signs of improvement, Mr. Tonkin said today, indicating that water is the source of the disease. Several were too far gone when caught, and died. A number discarded signs of paralysis of the legs and wings, and are romping around the enclosure.

The public is invited to inspect the birds.

Murray Finches

Murray finched for the first time during the course of his trial when sentence was pronounced, but he sat down quickly beside Will R. King, his attorney.

Judge King announced this morning that he had abandoned the idea of filing a motion for a new trial, but that an appeal would be taken. The court has allowed him until December 5 to file a bill of exceptions on appeal.

Other Trial Starts

Immediately after Murray had been sentenced the court resumed consideration of the case of Ellsworth Kelley and James Willes. Murray's companions in the break, who are also being tried for the murder of Guard Sweeney on the ground that they were parties to the conspiracy which resulted in the murder of the guard. By order of the court, the jury in the trial of Willes and Kelley, who are being tried jointly, was taken to the prison to view the scene of the escape, where they spent the remainder of the morning.

Allen Carson, special assistant prosecutor, will open with a statement of the state's case immediately after the noon recess. It is anticipated that the first testimony of witnesses will be heard late in the afternoon.

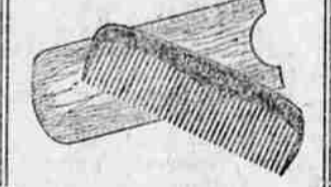
