OREGON TRAINS FOR NEXT GAME

State University Will Play California at Portland Next Saturday

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 19.—With the dawn of a new week, grim determination today settled down over the University of Oregon athletic field where football warriors are in training for the tilt Saturday in Portland, with the University of California.

For several weeks the players have been keeping California in mind as they trained, but with actual arrival of the week in which the game will occur, a new feeling crept over. To hold California down is a hard task for any team, and the Oregon men are determined that they will be the ones to do it if any can.

Oregon won Saturday from Pacific university by a small score of 13 to 0, in a slow and uninteresting game.

When California faces the Web-footers Saturday, she will face every Oregon player, in good condition, according to the present outlook. The biggest cause of worry has been big Lynn Jones, fullback, who has been carrying a badly damaged wrist since the Idaho game. He will be back in the line-up, however, the trainers say.

When the game is called, proteges of two Smiths will face each other. Coach Andy Smith is of California. Coach Dick Smith is of Oregon. There will be no brotherly feeling, however, for they are not related.

He is survived by a sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. George Dixon of Kirk and a mother, Mrs. Ida Broeffle, of Ontario, Canada. He had been working for the lumber company a month.

FULLERS, BURKE ON TRIAL TODAY

Alleged Assailants of E. X. Kendall in Court on Serious Charge

Three men went on trial this morning on a serious charge, that of attempting to take a human life. They are Charles Fuller, Edward Fuller and Jim Burke, who are charged with shooting Ed Kendall, at that time a deputy sheriff and now a justice of the peace.

Late this morning but eleven tentative jurors had been selected. The defense had exercised seven of its 12 peremptory challenges and the state one of its six challenges. When it appeared that the jury panel was exhausted, Judge A. L. Leavitt issued a special venire for 12 additional jurors and adjourned court until 2:30 this afternoon to allow the sheriff's office time to serve the subpoenas.

Tentative jurors selected were Lawrence Arnett, Antone Caeka, J. W. Haskins, J. A. Thompson, Howard Abbey, W. H. Himmelwright, Frank Kenter, W. L. Frahn, Alfred Castell, F. E. Masten and G. W. Houston.

The case is one arising out of the wounding of Ed Kendall in the arm June 15 of this year near Olone. Kendall was severely hurt and unable to assume his duties as deputy for several months.
