Roberts and Balsiger felt that Kennedy should be given definite assurance by the council that he would receive the job of project engineer of the \$100,000 sewer extension plan, for which he will draw plans.

"That was the understanding from the first," Roberts said. "You heard him say in this room that he would not pay him to go ahead with the preliminary work unless he could be assured the job of engineer in carrying the job through to completion. On this preliminary report, Kennedy wouldn't make any more. We owe it to him to promise him the job."

Stuckey and Cofer couldn't see it that way and Cofer so expressed himself without compunction. "There is too much money involved in this proposition to promise anything," he declared. "I will not be a party to any promises when it concerns such a large project. The city should be protected, and to promise Mr. Kennedy the job of project engineer would be a mistake."

And so that went, also, back and forth across the council table, until it came to a vote. The council was evenly split, and the ordinance failed to pass.

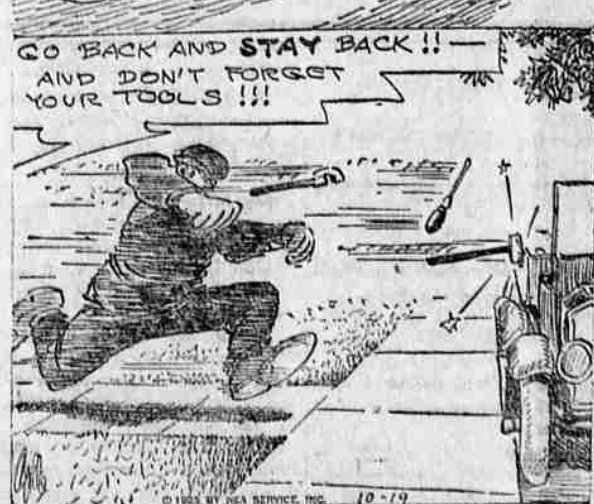
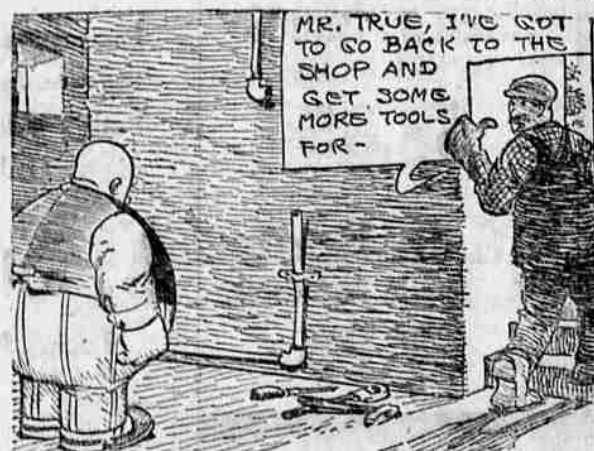
And so it went, with no decision made on the matter. Finally the council dropped the subject with the statement that it would be taken up when there was more time to consider it.
