Announcement of the building of the new two story brick building was made by Mr. Grizzle about two weeks ago and since that time work has been progressing in a rapid manner.

Civil War In China Serious

Soldiers Mutiny And Fighting Spreads Quickly

SHANGHAI, Oct. 20. (AP)—Renewal of civil war in China, hitherto localized, to the district between Shanghai and Hankow, today assumed a more serious aspect with the return to the political and military area of Wu Pei-Fu, military dictator at Peking from 1922 to 1924, and the mutiny of two Kiangsu divisions who hitherto have accounted the leadership of the Manchurian militarist.

Advices to Reuter's agency here say that he is expected to arrive today in Hankow and there announce his assumption of the title of Commander in Chief of the Central provinces, this alliance to include Kiangsu, in which Shanghai is located; Chekiang, Anhui, Kiangsi, Hupel, and Fukien.

Astoria Wins Road Tax Case

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 20. — The city of Astoria today won in the supreme court its mandamus proceeding against Clatsop county to compel the county court to levy a road tax, a part of which would be available for use by the city. The opinion, written by Justice Bean, is a reversal of Judge J. A. Eakin of the lower court for Clatsop county.

The opinion allows a writ of mandamus commanding the county court to levy a tax for 1925, and annually thereafter, of not less than one mill nor more than 10 mills on all taxable property in the county. Since the proceeding was commenced the time for levying of the taxes for 1923 and 1924 has passed, therefore it is not possible to make the writ apply to those years.

Butler May Stay at Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 20. (AP)—Mayor Kendrick announced today that he would make a formal request of President Coolidge to extend General Smedley D. Butler's leave of absence from the marine corps so that he may continue as director of public safety here. The announcement followed the receipt of advices from Washington that the matter depended largely upon the wishes of the mayor.

"Bud" Fisher Will Soon Wed Wealthy Widow

Creator of Mutt and Jeff Engaged to Countess

NEW YORK, Oct. 20. (AP)—Mutt and Jeff now appear in the role of matchmaker. Their creator, "Bud" Fisher, is going to get married next week and he says Mutt and Jeff are partly responsible.

The future Mrs. Harry Fisher is not only wealthy, the winner of a Paris beauty prize in 1922, but a countess. Fellow passengers on the Leviathan which arrived yesterday, who saw the cartoonist talking with the Countess De Beaumont, did not suspect that they were discussing

matrimony and a honeymoon.

On landing Fisher went to his apartment and the Countess registered at a hotel with her seven year son, Pierre De Beaumont.

The bride-to-be says it all came about through her son's fondness for the Mutt and Jeff cartoonist. "Naturally," she says, "when my boy was so interested it increased my own interest."

The former Aedra Stuart of Paris married the Count De Beaumont in 1917. Her father-in-law, was reputed, before his death, to be the wealthiest nobleman in France. The Countess has lived in Paris since her husband's death and it was there that she met Fisher, three years ago.

Fisher, who was married in 1912 to Pauline Welch, a vaudeville actress, and divorced by her in 1917, returned six weeks ago from a trip to Paris, "expecting a decision." The decision came by cable and he hurried back to Paris. Fisher says that he and his bride

expect to live on a steamer between New York and Paris. "You can put us down as commuters from Paris to New York," he says.

American Steamer Seized on Ocean

NEW YORK, Oct. 20. (AP)—The American steamer Carone was escorted into the harbor today by a coast guard cutter. It was reported she had been seized about forty miles off Atlantic City when contraband was found on board.

FIGHTING REPORTED

LONDON, Oct. 20. (AP)—An Athens dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph says fighting has been in progress for the last 19 hours on the Greco-Bulgarian frontier near Demirhisar. There is no confirmation of this report from other sources.

ANOTHER VESSEL BURNS ON OCEAN

BOSTON, Oct. 20. (AP)—The steamer Stockwell, vessel of the Brockbank-Cunard line, that was reported on fire in dispatches from London today, has been sunk at a coaling station in Algeria. It was said in advices received here today from Lloyd's, London. The Stockwell was bound from Calcutta and Colombo to Boston, New York and Philadelphia.
