DAVENPORT CASE — 18 1/2 Whether or not Mrs. Marie Davenport is entitled to ownership of her home on south Riverside will be decided by the state supreme court, it became known today.

A decision by Judge A. L. Leavitt awarded Mrs. Davenport unrestricted ownership of the home, despite the claim of Garret Van Ripper, trustee in bankruptcy for Mrs. Davenport's dead husband's estate.

In the case, which was tried here in circuit court, Mrs. Davenport had claimed her home exempt from bankruptcy judgment. Van Ripper declared that the home should be sacrificed in bankruptcy proceedings just as the rest of the Davenport assets.

MRS. KELLOGG APPEALS CASE

Dissatisfied with the decision of Judge A. L. Leavitt, Mrs. Edna A. Kellogg has decided to appeal to the state supreme court, it became known today.

The case was one in which Mrs. Kellogg lost in a suit for divorce. Her husband, who filed a counter suit for divorce, was granted the decree and also a substantial interest in their property.

Whether or not the husband was entitled to an interest in the Kellogg apartments, was one of the main issues of the case. According to Judge Leavitt's decision, Kellogg was awarded one third interest in the apartment house.

M. E. Church South Is Against Unity

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 22.—(AP)—A motion today in the Pacific conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, for unification with the former parent church was lost through failure to reach the two thirds decision necessary. The vote was 92 for unification and 39 against it, falling six votes short of the necessary two thirds.
