## RUM RUNNER IS GIVEN FREEDOM

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—The motorship Quitchow, believed to have been loaded to her scupper tops with what is now known as "real" Scotch, sailed right into San Francisco Harbor today, turned around and sailed right out again, and all under escort of the coast guard.

The rum chaser number 255, bobbing around in the roadstead off the Golden Gate, sighted the Quitchow as at dawn. She had been long sought as a rum runner. The little chaser took her in as a prize and put all of her crew under arrest.

Once in the port the skipper of the Quitchow asserted himself. He talked hard and fast. He said that he had been taken outside the 12 mile limit until he proved it.

There was nothing for the 255 to do but escort the Quitchow back to sea again.

## Chevrolet Makes Factory Record

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 20.—The Chevrolet Motor company built 55,865 motor cars and trucks during September, a new record for that month and only 378 fewer than the highest production month in the history of the company.

Ordinarily sales and consequently production are expected to decrease during the latter part of the year. However, the demand for Chevrolet cars which has held production at high figures throughout the year continues undiminished. As a result the schedule for the present month contemplates the building of more than 54,500 cars and trucks.

August deliveries to dealers in the United States alone were 41,500, an August record. This figure is exclusive of the thousands of cars shipped to foreign countries. During September deliveries in the United States increased to approximately 44,500, placing September second only to April and May of this year and exceeding the domestic deliveries for June, July and August, respectively.

"I am proud of these records for two reasons," said Charles F. Barta, vice-president in charge of production.

"My first reason is that since March the Chevrolet production has remained consistently at 50,000 or more without the usual seasonal fluctuations. This indicates that the automobile industry is becoming stabilized upon a regular year-round demand.

"My second reason is that the September production proved conclusively the loyalty and capacity of the Chevrolet manufacturing organization. Unceasing demand for cars from the Chevrolet dealers made it necessary early in September to increase the September production schedule nearly 7,000, the new schedule calling for 53,165 cars and trucks. A production increase of that magnitude is a severe test of any manufacturing organization. The sales department would have desired us to increase the production schedule even more sharply. The results exceeded our highest expectations. The loyal workers in the Chevrolet factories, most of them veterans who are proud of their jobs and proud of their product, responded to a man. They came through with the record September production of 55,865 which was 2,700 more cars than we had asked for even under the revised schedule."

## PAVLOVA WILL DANCE ON

LONDON, Oct. 22. —(AP)— Mme. Anna Pavlova, the famous dancer, declares that artists should never retire, and she herself has no intention of abandoning dancing, despite reports to the contrary. After a season in England, she plans to go to France and then make a tour of Australia and South Africa.

"It has long been my opinion that an artist should never give up," Mme. Pavlova said. "Artistic ambition should be to the last gasp."

## CURATOR MAY HAVE FOUND SITE OF LEGENDARY CHEROKEE TRIBE

LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 22.—(AP)—What may have been the habitat of the legendary lost tribe of Cherokee Indians for which the famous Chief Sequoia lost his life in the search in 1845, has been uncovered in Richardson county, Nebraska, by E. E. Blackman, curator of the State Historical Society museum.

Prof. Blackman found the remains of an ancient Indian city, together with several pieces of pottery and many chipped flint tools, different from those made by tribes hitherto known to have inhabited that region.

Uncertain articles bear unmistakable signs of Cherokee origin, Mr. Blackman said. This led him to believe it possible that the site was once the location of the lost tribe which legends say split away from the tribal home in southeastern United States and pushed across the Mississippi never to return. The migration is supposed to have taken place before the white man came to America.

## At the PINE TREE

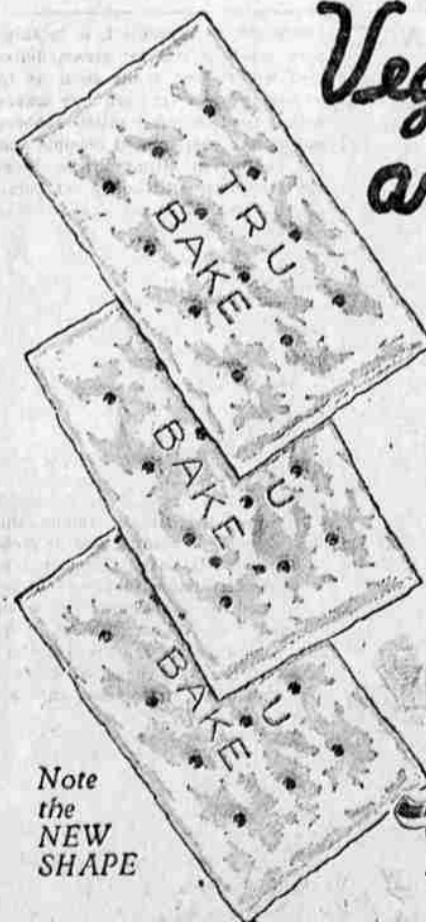
