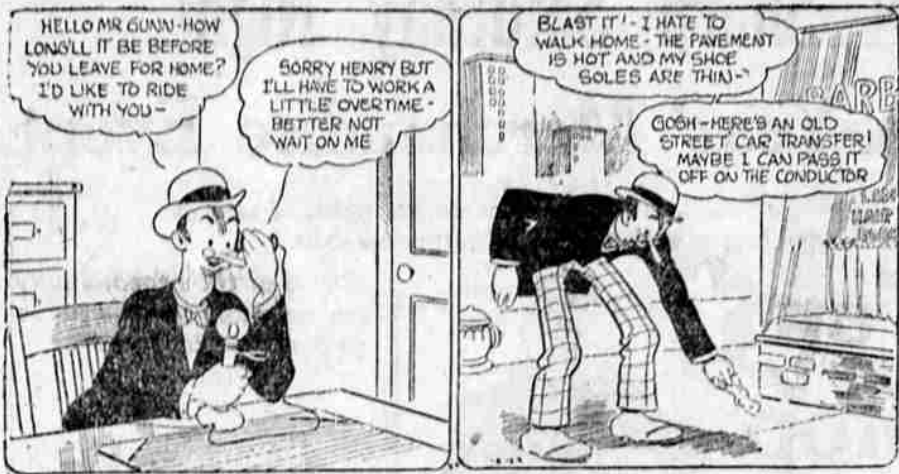

TRIO TO SERVE PRISON TERMS

ence should have counseled him to avoid violence. "Although cognizant of the recommendation of leniency by the jury which convicted you," the court said in addressing the younger Fuller, Charles, "still it must judiciously handle that word leniency and not extend its meaning too far."

The court then sentenced the younger Fuller to five years in the state penitentiary. The three prisoners were returned to jail and some time the latter part of this week will be taken north to Salem where they will begin to serve their long sentences.

**Leniency Urged**  
Proceeding the sentence of the three men, their attorney, Edward B. Ashurst, pleaded with the court to extend leniency to the defendants. Ashurst was answered with a clear cut and brief talk from the deputy district attorney, W. A. West, who pointed out to the court that while the state did not demand an eye for an eye, still the ends of justice must be served.

"The state is not vindictive in this matter," he pointed out. "But we do request that a substantial sentence be moted out to these four defendants who have been convicted of a crime, particularly violent in its nature."

**Caution Urged**  
"As to the question of leniency in the case of Charles Fuller, I might say that court would not go wrong in handling that word leniency cautiously. True, it should be recognized, but it should not prevent a just sentence."

The two Fullers were hit hard by the prospect of serving years in the state prison, but Burke, big, broad shouldered and clear eyed, openly laughed as he made his way back to his seat by the side of the court room wall.

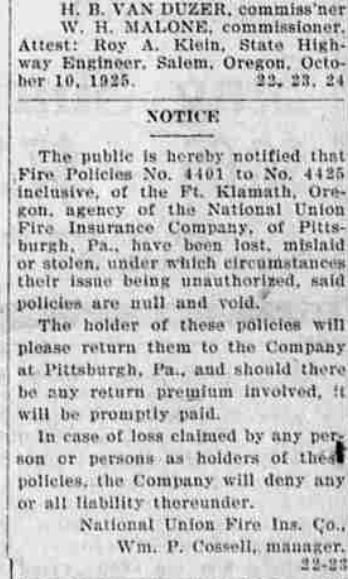
A complete set of plans and specifications may also be inspected at the State Highway Office, Room 8, Court House, Klamath Falls, Ore.
