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MANY KILLED AT LARGE CEREMONY

LONDON, Oct. 22. (AP)—Details of the disaster at Tanta, Egypt, during a great religious ceremony, in which fifty four persons are reported to have been killed and many injured, are being awaited with much interest.

The reports thus far received vary. One is to the effect that panic seized upon the great crowd while the mounted police were endeavoring to make a passage for the minister of Pious foundations. Another says that the railing of a bridge broke and that hundreds of persons were thrown into the water. Fifty were drowned and large numbers were trampled to death. Still another report which also refers to the breaking of the bridge parapet, says that fifty four persons were drowned and hundreds injured.

The occasion for the great gathering was the feast in honor of Saeid-El-Bedawi, a Moslem saint of great renown, whose aid is invoked when strength is needed to resist a sudden calamity.

1500 WORKMEN BACK AT WORK

Striking Employees Return on Agreement of Minimum Wage of \$3.75

ABERDEEN, Wash., Oct. 22.—The strike of 1500 workmen in six Aberdeen sawmills, in progress for nearly four weeks, ended late yesterday when strikers in mass meeting voted to return under a minimum wage of \$3.75 per day. The new scale represents an increase of 50 cents per day for minimum paid workers, but is a compromise over the strikers' original demands for a horizontal 50 cent increase for all workers.

Caillaux Discusses Debt With Colleagues

PARIS, Oct. 23. (AP)—The French cabinet meeting today broke up without Finance Minister Caillaux fully detailing his fiscal measures or submitting his resignation which had been anticipated in some quarters. The cabinet is to meet again on Monday.

While not giving the details of his plans, M. Caillaux laid the financial position of the country before his colleagues in general terms.
